STATE C. OF C. TO PUT OUT UP-TO-DATE BOOKLET

PORTLAND, May 1.—A state wide survey of Oregon's agricultural, industrial, mineral, scenic and other natural resources has been ordered by the Board of Directors of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce. The data gathered in this survey will be used in the compilation of a booklet descriptive of Oregon's resources.

Decision to undertake the survey was reached after reports by Directors in charge of the various departments of the State Chamber of Commerce showed that Oregon as a State has not sufficient data available setting forth in exact terms what the various districts have to offer to prospective settlers and investors.

Secretary George Quayle was instructed to get in touch immediately with all state commissions and departments, the Oregon Agricultural College and Experimental Station, the Oregon Bureau of Mines and all other sources of authentic information. These organizations and departments will be asked to state to what extent they can assist an undertaking of this kind.

AUTO CAMP GROUND MAKES GOOD SHOWING

Sunday evening marked the end of the first week of the season at the local auto camp grounds, after the official opening. There was a total of 53 machines camped on the grounds during the week, and as in the past, the campers were practically unanimous in the opinion that the Ashland camp is the best they had ever seen.

CUT IN FREIGHT RATES ANNOUNCED BY S. P. CO.

Reduction in transcontinental freight rates on agricultural implements from eastern points to the Pacific coast terminals ranges from \$2.66 1/2 from New York to \$2.25 1/2 from St. Louis and will be reduced to \$2 per 100 pounds provided the interstate commerce commission grants the carriers relief from the long and short haul clause of the commerce act.

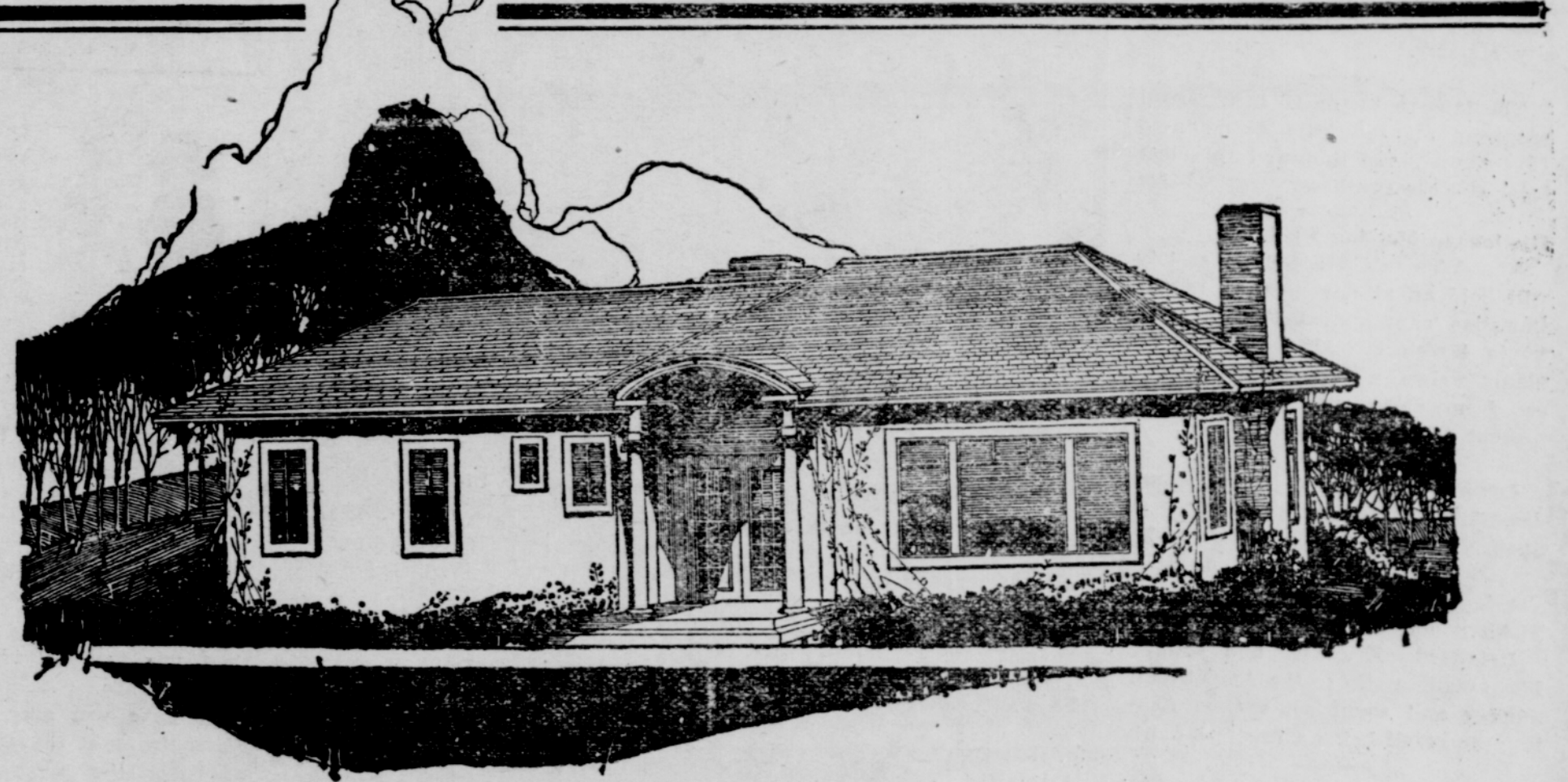
