NEW HAVEN, Conn., May 4.—Lawrence F. He was sentenced to one year in jail and to pay a fine of \$1000. He was released on a bond of \$2500 pending appeal.

INTERESTING FACTS

An electrical method for quickly detecting counterfeit coins has been invented by a mint official in India. A new gauge for registering the air pressure in automobile tires replaces the valve cap and does not have to be removed when a tire is filled. The Pekin Gazette, founded in A. D. 908, was for a long time the only journal permitted to be published in China, but within the last sixty years a number of others have been established.

The windows of the famous South-west cathedral in London have not been washed in 20 years. Motor-driven, a new machine into which safety razor blades can be inserted while it is in motion, sharpens 250 of them an hour. New window shade brackets not only can be adjusted to hold shades of different widths, but are also equipped with hooks for curtain poles. A loose movable disk replaces the usual slide electrode in a new French spark plug and prevents oil and carbon rising to form short circuits.

MAPS BEING MADE BY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

A sketched map has been set up at the Chamber of Commerce rooms and as many copies as desired may be run off without any further expense than the cost of the paper.

The map shows Lithia Park as the center of a large number of attractions such as Crater Lake, Lake of the Woods, Oregon Caves, Mount Ashland, Mount McLaughlin and the various towns grouped about Ashland.

It shows the highway as far south as Redding and as far north as Eugene, the road to Crescent City, the Green Springs road, the Dead Indian road, and the Crater Lake road through the northern part of the county. The distances from Ashland to the various points north and south on the highway are also given. This map advertises Ashland's auto camp ground as the "best in the west" and Ashland as a central point from which one may enjoy either bathing, fishing, hunting or mountain climbing, or all of them if one desires.

The map as printed, makes a nice little folder for the tourist, and one which he will probably keep until he gets ready to come to Ashland again. Mr. Doran, attendant at the camp ground, is being kept supplied with the maps and says that the tourists are glad to get them.

Fourth July Plans Are Discussed

The second meeting to consider the question of a Fourth of July celebration was held at the city hall last night. A representative number of citizens were present, and there was a general discussion of the subject, nearly every one expressing himself as to the desirability of continuing the celebration and whether it should be undertaken in a moderate or more pretentious manner. Some thought it might be better if no attempt were made for a celebration, and some other town in the valley given the opportunity to put on the "big show." This was not the prevailing opinion, however, for when a show of hands was called for, the vote was unanimous for Ashland to celebrate, and the opinion expressed that it should be recognized as an annual Ashland event.

The question of financing the proposition and the amount of money required to do so was carefully considered, and it was shown that \$2000 is necessary to make a good celebration. It was recommended that the committee ask the Chamber of Commerce to endeavor to raise this amount for the purpose.

Rev. C. A. Edwards strongly urged that a great national orator be secured as the speaker of the day. The secretary was advised to telegraph the Hon. A. J. Beveridge, of Indiana, to ascertain if he could be secured. The names of Senator Hiram Johnson, Governor Henry Allen of Kansas, and others were suggested. It was felt that a big parade should be one of the main attractions, and that an athletic program, band concerts, and a bigger than ever fireworks display should be aimed at.

When it is considered that the estimate of the committee calling for \$2000 for this purpose only means a per capita assessment of 50 cents or thereabouts for our population, and that Ashland's Fourth of July is becoming a southern Oregon institution, it would seem that a ready response should be given the Chamber of Commerce when the canvass is made for the annual budget in which this amount is included.
