Parallel Careers of Senator Lodge and Speaker of House Gillette Who Are Up for Re-election

WASHINGTON, May 10.—The magic wand of destiny that for four decades has safely guided the political ships of Henry Cabot Lodge and William Huntington Gillette through many stormy voyages will be returned to the hands of "the people" again this coming November.

Stranger even than fiction, the public lives of these two veteran statesmen have run in an amazing parallel. Born in the same state, graduated from the same law school, admitted to the same bar, joining the same political faith, both have served to the day the same length of time in their respective offices. Now, after 29 years' consecutive service as leaders in their respective offices, both must stand for re-election on the same day in next November.

This strange parallel, briefly summarized, is as follows: Both born in Massachusetts: Lodge in 1850, Gillette in 1851.

Both graduates from Harvard law school: Lodge in 1875, Gillette in 1877.

Both admitted to the Massachusetts bar: Lodge in 1876, Gillette in 1877.

Both entered public office in Massachusetts: Lodge in 1883, Gillette in 1879.

Both elected to Massachusetts state house: Lodge in 1885, Gillette in 1890.

Both elected to the house of representatives: Lodge in 1887, Gillette in 1893.

Both served 29 years in present office: Lodge in senate, Gillette in house.

Both standing for re-election this year: Lodge for senate, Gillette for the house.
