MURRAY WINS IN KLAMATH FALLS NEWSPAPER ROW

KLAMATH FALLS, May 15.—Settlement of the newspaper row here came when a decision for the plaintiff was made by Judge C. F. Stone in the case of E. J. Murray, former owner of the Evening Herald, against the Klamath Record Publishing company, and Don Belding, managing editor.

Rube was lodged in the county jail late last night. His surrender, the authorities said, was brought about through his wife, who is the mother of three small children.

SALEM, Or., May 15.—Arguments before the Oregon supreme court in the case of Dr. Richard M. Brumfield, Roseburg dentist, who is in the state penitentiary here awaiting execution for the murder of Dennis Russell, formerly a resident of Dillard, Douglas county, probably will be set for June 15.

Dr. Brumfield was received at the penitentiary last September. Officials at the prison said that the dentist had gained in weight, and with the exception of suffering from spells of melancholy, apparently is enjoying the best of health.

BURGLARS ON A RAMPAGE MAKE TWO HAULS HERE

The fact that the Ninger and Warner sporting goods store was entered by burglars Saturday night after the place was closed at about 1 o'clock, was discovered Sunday morning, when Mr. Ninger came to open the place of business about 7 o'clock.

Entrance was gained by jimmying the basement window on Pioneer avenue, from where the main floor was gained without any particular trouble.

Among the articles taken were a fishing reel, an Astra pistol, a Spanish made pistol, a Mauser automatic, a Remington repeating rifle, a Swiss alarm watch, one Eastman kodak, a fountain pen and several sets of dice.

The burglars apparently left by the same way that they gained entrance and no clue has been found that has availed the police of any definite information at this time.

SPORTING GOODS STORE ROBBED IN EUGENE

EUGENE, Or., May 15.—Two more Eugene stores were robbed of several hundred dollars worth of goods last night. At the Henderson sporting goods store 15 revolvers valued at between \$200 and \$250 were taken from a drawer after entrance to the building was effected from the rear through a window. Codding, who some time ago filed as the only democratic party candidate, has withdrawn, leaving the field now open to the several republican candidates for representative.

The divorce was granted on the showing made by the wife and her mother, Mrs. Dora Sherman, that Austin C. Mau of Sacramento, had been extremely cruel.

HIGH WATERS CLOSE GOLD RAY FISH LADDERS

MEDFORD, May 15.—Local sportsmen report that the fish ladders at Gold Ray dam have been closed because of high waters having washed out the racks at the Elk creek hatchery, and the hatchery force does not want to permit the fish to pass the hatchery on their way up the river before the eggs can be taken from them. It will be three weeks before the hatchery racks are reinstalled and the Gold Ray fish ladders opened.

LIGHT SHOCK OF EARTHQUAKE HITS PORTLAND

TREMBLOR SHOOK UP THE CITY EARLY THIS MORNING, BUT DID NO DAMAGE

Quake Was Felt Throughout North-West, But No Damage Was Done Except to Rattle Windows and Dishes.

PORTLAND, May 15.—A slight earthquake shock of short duration was felt in various sections of the city at 9:30 o'clock this morning. Dishes and windows rattled in about every building in the city, but so far no damage has been reported. The tremor apparently swept the northwestern coast, as reports from Vancouver, Wash., state that city was shaken about the same time as Portland.
