## HALL IN LEAD BUT RESULT IN DOUBT

### Gubernatorial Contest Develops Into A Neck-and-Neck Race

#### VOTE IS LIGHT OVER STATE

Alford for County Commissioner and Thomas for Circuit Judge Have an Easy Victory--Latter Runs Strong in Josephine--Both Public Service Commissioners are Recalled.

From present indications the gubernatorial race is so close that it is not likely the actual result will be known until the official results are announced. It is considered somewhat surprising that considering the bitterness with which the campaign has been waged throughout the state, a very light vote has been polled. The ratio in Ashland is about on a par with the rest of the state. Here about one-third of the registered voters went to the polls. At the hour of going to press, Hall was still in the lead over Olcott, but pretty much all of eastern Oregon is still to be heard from.

In this county, George Dunn gets the senatorial nomination, having no opposition. Thomas H. Simpson, candidate for county commissioner, went down to defeat before George Alvord of Phoenix. Senator Charles Thomas, the candidate for circuit judge has overwhelmingly defeated Gus Newbury, both in Jackson and Josephine counties.

PORTLAND, May 20, 2:30 p. m.—With 415 of 426 Multnomah precincts complete and incomplete returns from 30 other counties, Hall is leading Olcott by the narrow margin of 701 votes—Hall 36,960, Olcott 36,259.

With most of the missing votes due from outside counties, where Olcott has shown a slight edge, he may yet pull out with the republican gubernatorial nomination in his pocket. It is so much a "hoss race" that it may take an official canvass to decide which nosed out the winner in yesterday's election.

The state was having the road scraped and it is expected to be in good condition throughout except for the old grade over Camas mountain, which will be eliminated as soon as the new grade is completed.
