

Memorial Day Committee Have Plans Completed

Memorial day plans are rounding into shape nicely. The committee reports developments are running quite satisfactorily, and they hope to make this Ashland's most loyally supported and conducted affair of its kind yet attempted.

The plans begin with a Legion service at the Memorial rock in the park, in the memory of the much-beloved and highly honored comrades who gave their best for their country. They cannot be too highly or loyally remembered. This service will be completely Legion, and will take place at 8:45 in the forenoon.

After this, the plans show that the First company, O. N. G., the G. A. R., the Spanish War veterans, and the ex-service men (including the American Legion) are to assemble at the Army for the march to the Plaza. The Women's Relief Corp., the American Legion Auxiliary and the Daughters of the American Revolution will assemble at their respective halls and march to the Plaza. All organizations to be ready to form the parade column on the Plaza at 9:30 sharp.

The parade line-up as they have it planned will be as follows:

1. Marshal of the Day.
2. Ashland Band.
3. First Company, Oregon National Guard.
4. Grand Army of the Republic.
5. Veterans of the Spanish-American War.
6. Veterans of the World War (including the American Legion).
7. Women's Relief Corps of the G. A. R.
8. American Legion Auxiliary.
9. Daughters of the American Revolution.
10. Mayor, City Officials, City Council and School Board.

11. Boy Scouts of America.
12. Camp Fire Girls.
13. Citizens.
14. School Children.

The march will continue to the Ashland cemetery, where the usual G. A. R. and W. R. C. service will be given together with such auxiliary service as the Legion Auxiliary and D. A. R. may add for the memory of all veterans and comrades of the past wars.

Upon conclusion there will be a ten minute period in which to visit the graves and view the decorations, etc., then the bugler will sound assembly for the return march to the band stand in Lithia park, where a splendid address has been arranged for.

After the address it is planned to have a basket dinner in the park for every one.

During the afternoon there are to be committees appointed to visit the Hargadine, Mountain View, Talent and Hill cemeteries, where proper attention will be given to the grave decoration in these plots.

It is earnestly hoped by the committee that the people of Ashland will heartily respond and co-operate in these memorable exercises, by a goodly attendance, and plenty of thoughts concerning the reasons why we have a Memorial or Decoration day. When we stop to realize that May 30th is no longer a national Memorial day, but is now an international Memorial day, in which many great nations take part with exactly the same thoughts in mind, we are lead to believe that there must be something to it more than a day for recreation and fishing trips.

Give due regard for this occasion and remember our individual part toward those who have given us this privilege to cultivate the exalted thoughts that are ours during these Memorial days.
