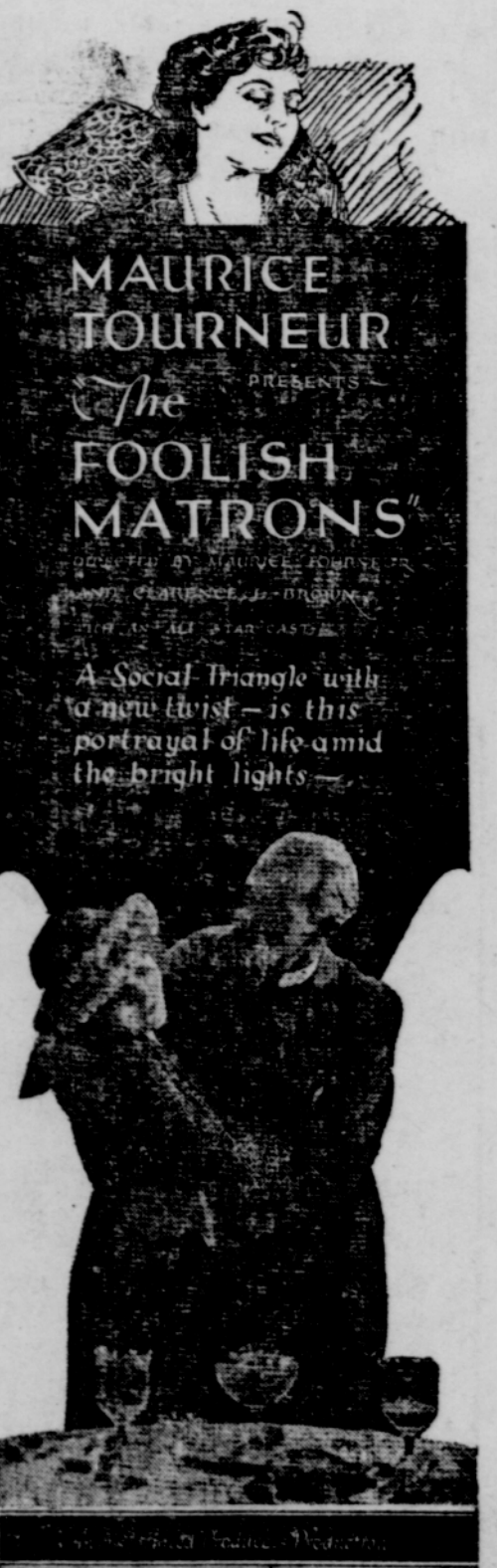
Gives Farewell Party
