CHICAGO, June 5.—Signs of the times are seen here in the changing of the cry for "jobs" to the outbreak of signs for "men."

Requests to the Illinois state free employment offices jumped from 5568 in March to 669 for the first 25 days in May.

"Within 30 days I feel sure that any man who will work will be able to get a job," Charles J. Boyd, secretary of the employment service declared.

Huge increases in building activities presage even larger demands for men this summer, Boyd stated. Needs for labor from basic industries is also on the upturn.
