BOYS LEAVE SOON FOR ENCAMPMENT

Great enthusiasm reigns among the men belonging to the company, and the largest turnout Ashland has ever sent to camp will leave here this year. This is largely on account of the splendid location for the camp, being about 25 miles from the Canadian border on the shores of the Strait of Juan de Fuca, and close to the cities of Port Townsend, Victoria, B. C., and Seattle.

The troop train, which will be composed entirely of sleepers, will arrive in Portland the night of June 14, and will continue on to Seattle, arriving there the next morning. After a short lay-over at Seattle, the men will go by steamer to Fort Worden.

First company, having the senior captain of the coast artillery of Oregon, has secured the assignment to the 12-inch battery, and it will certainly be an educational experience for the young men of Ashland, who have never seen a gun shoot with a range of 10 to 15 miles.

The company has been fortunate in securing two capable restaurant men as cooks, namely, Messrs. Spencer and Jarvis, and with the liberal allowance for food made by the government, no one will go hungry.

Ashland People Served With Best Milk in Valley

E. B. Poyer, of Ashland, again leads the Rogue River Cow Testing association with a herd average of 1108 pounds of milk and 49.34 pounds of butterfat. This average is higher than that of April, and he also has the high individual production record, made by Rose, a Jersey-Swiss—1582 pounds of milk and 80.20 pounds of fat. Fred Puhl, of Medford, has the second highest cow, Beatt, who produced 1361

pounds of milk and 73.49 pounds of fat. R. E. Robison, of Talent, has an average of 869 pounds of milk and 43.27 of fat for his herd of 13 Jerseys, and W. E. Moor, of Ashland, has an average of 903 pounds of milk and 41.20 pounds of fat. The 40-pound list contains 64 cows out of 248 which were tested during the month. The following cows produced more than 50 pounds of fat each:
