LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT—I. Virginia Fales, the widow of Francis M. Fales, who died in 1901, formerly of Richfield, in the state of Washington, being of sound and dis-

posing mind and memory, do make and declare this to be my Last Will and Testament, and I do hereby revoke any and all wills by me heretofore made.

1. I have no children, and do now reside at the city of Ashland, Jackson county, state of Oregon.

2. I direct that upon my decease, my body be buried by the side of my deceased husband, in the cemetery at Vancouver, state of Washington.

3. I direct my executor, hereinafter named, to pay, as soon as funds

are available from my estate, without any order of the court in the premises, all my just debts, expenses of last illness and funeral expenses.

4. I devise and bequeath to my half-brother A. L. Lamb, my home property situated in the town of Richfield, in the state of Washington, consisting of a house and eight lots fronting on Main street, together with all the appurtenances pertaining thereto.

5. I will, devise and bequeath to my half-brother, Henry A. Lamb, the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) and to his son, Cecil Lamb, my nephew, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00), to be paid to them and each of them as soon as the funds are available from my estate, to make such payments.

6. I will, devise and bequeath to Laura Crawford, my half-sister, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

7. I will, devise and bequeath to Paul Elwell, a friend, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

8. Should any of the aforesaid devisees die before my decease, the bequest to such deceased devisee shall, thereupon, become void, and the amount thereof shall inure to the benefit of the residue of my estate.

9. Should there be insufficient in my estate to pay the aforesaid cash bequests in full, each devisee who

would under this will be entitled to same, shall take of such cash in pro rata according to the amount of the bequest, and should there be a residue after paying all of the bequests aforesaid, such residue, I will, devise and bequeath to the said A. L. Lamb.

10. I do hereby nominate and appoint my half-brother, A. L. Lamb, commonly known as A. L. Lamb, of Ashland, Oregon, the executor of this will and I do direct and request that he be not required to give any bond or bonds in the matter of said trust.
