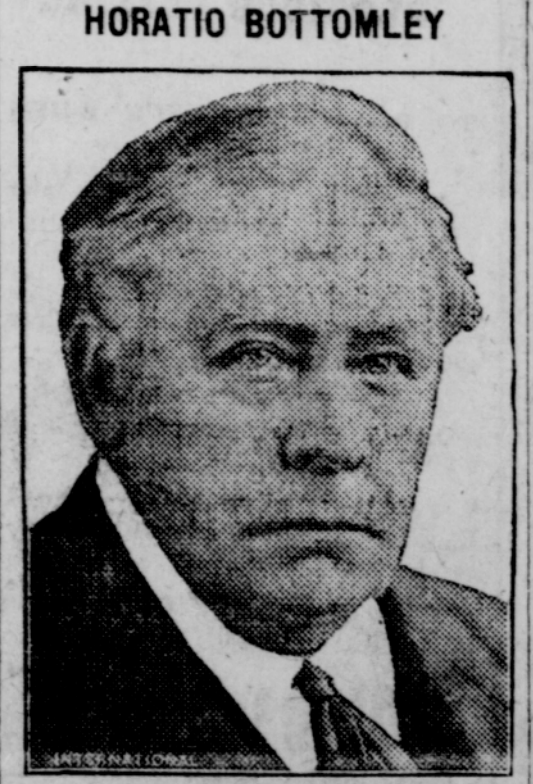
Returns from Corvallis—

AUTO PLUNGES OVER CLIFF, TWO OCCUPANTS INJURED. DOWNIEVILLE, Calif., June 8.—Two men are at a local hotel today at the edge of death, following an automobile accident yesterday, in which they were carried 100 feet into the canyon of the Yuba river, when their machine left the road on a curve five miles from here.
