## MURDER OF CIRCUS MAN IS LAID

MOUNT HOLLY, N. J., June 14 .-The widow of John T. Brunen, circus owner, who was shot and killed on March 10, is under arrest here today on a charge of murder.

Brunen, known as "Honest John' among circus folk, was killed by a charge from a shotgun as he sat reading in his home at Riverside, N. J., his killing, the police believe, being the result of a plot between members of the family.


