DRIVER ESCAPES BY VERY NARROW MARGIN

G. H. Nutting, of Anderson, employed by the California highway commission as truck driver, had an accident this week, which came very near resulting in his death by drowning, says the Siskiyou News. En route to the mouth of Beaver creek with a load of supplies for the camp in process of building as a headquarters for highway work down the Klamath river, he crossed the Klamath on the bridge at the De Avila place on the north side of the stream. On leaving the bridge his brakes failed to hold in descending the pitch from the north end of the structure, and he lost control of his vehicle. Crashing into the cable the top was broken down and acted as a cage from which he was unable to escape when the truck at last rolled into the river. In the cold waters of the turbulent stream he battled for his life, until when he emerged from the death trap he did so over the radiator of the machine and coming to the surface of the water floated to the bank some distance below, where his hand involuntarily grasped some brush on the bank, which is directly responsible for his being alive today. Exhausted, he was pulled to safety by a workman, who had been attracted by his cries for help.

TEACHERS TAKING STATE EXAMINATIONS THIS WEEK

Forty-three Jackson county teachers and prospective teachers are writing the state examinations for teachers at the court house at Jacksonville this week. Out of the 43, all but four are women.
