MUSIC THAT IS IMMORTAL

Mendelssohn Needs No Other Memorial Than He Left in His Wonderful Wedding March.

Possibly the most famous march ever written is the wedding march from the "Midsummer Night's Dream" by Felix Mendelssohn. Like the overture to his famous work it is a splendid example of Mendelssohn's astonishing musical fertility. The overture is now one hundred years old and is one of the greatest examples of precocity in any art. Although written by a youth of eighteen, it is one of the great classics of the tone art. The march was not written until later, but its glorious burst of exuberant harmony would make it an all-fascinating musical number even though it were not associated with the joyous occasion of marriage festivals. Mendelssohn's musical mind retained these numbers in wonderful fashion. Once when the score of his famous overture was left in a cab in London and lost, he blithely replied, "Never mind, I shall make another." After he had completed this immense work it was compared with the instrumental parts and found to be accurate to the last dot, even though Mendelssohn had made it from memory. Why did not Mendelssohn write other famous marches? He wrote others, but none quite so good as the wedding march. His "March of the High Priests" from "Athalia" is built upon the same formal lines and is an altogether beautiful work in classical march form.

AMBITION IS HARD MASTER

Success Means Concentration and a Willingness to Make Sacrifices for Its Attainment.

Ambition is more than a wish; it is desire intensified into determined purpose. All that is needed for the accomplishment of our ambitions is a desire so strong that we will sacrifice whatever may stand in the way of our success. The law of compensation never fails. Get this thought into your mind: If you are constantly "hating" the cause lies within yourself.—Forbes Magazine.

Sailing, Lashed to Trees.

Great trains of driftwood, bound for the Arctic, forever sail the Mackenzie river, and the voyager who happens to be going along with this forest debris often presses it into service instead of regarding it as an obstacle. HORSESHOE RULES TO BE USED IN CONTEST THE 4TH

The horseshoe pitching contest to be conducted at the Fourth of July celebration here, will be governed by the official rules of the grand league of the American Horseshoe Pitchers' association. Following are some of the more important rules that will be observed in the contest:

A standard game shall consist of 21 points, pitched at a distance of 38 1/2 feet between the pegs, and the contestant first scoring 21 points shall be declared the winner of the game.

Any shoe that shall strike the ground after leaving the pitcher's hand at a distance of more than 12 inches from the peg, shall be declared a foul shoe, and not entitled to score, and shall be removed from the ground before another pitch is made.

In all class A games a shoe which does not remain within six inches of the peg, shall not be entitled to score. In all class B games a shoe that does not remain within 12 inches of the peg shall not be entitled to score.

A leamer shall count one point, and shall have no higher scoring value than any other shoe that touches the peg.

A perfect ringer is a shoe that encircles the peg, right side up, after all shoes have been thrown, and counts five points.

If one contestant should have two perfect ringers, and the other two perfect ringers, neither side shall score.

Roman Relics in London.

An old Roman building dating back to the Third or Fourth century was uncovered by workmen in Grace Church street, London, while laying postal cables. One wall four and a half feet thick and extending downward 13 feet appears to form part of an inner chamber of a Roman building. The outline of the chamber is apparent and there are painted ornamentations on the walls. Museum officials believe that the walls belong to the original forum of Roman London.

Earth Not Solid.

A new discovery that the so-called solid earth is really a stiff jelly that is caused to tremble by waves beating on the shore has been made by an eminent geologist. Prof. J. W. Evans has reported to the royal institution that he has obtained at West Bronwich, in the English midlands, seismometer records of "wave quakes" produced by Atlantic rollers dashing against the shores of western Ireland, 300 miles away. His co-ordinated recording instruments showed that the tremor travels through the rock strata of the earth's crust at the rate of 180 miles a minute, each tremor being separated from the next by from five to eight seconds.

Last of Famous Company.

The last survivor of the history-making voyage of the steamship California to die was De Witt Clinton Thompson, pioneer banker, who died in Santa Rosa, February 28, 1846, the first steamship passed through the Golden gate. The steamship was the side-wheeler California, carrying from New York 400 gold-hungry argonauts, many of whom left their mark on the history of California. And today not one of the California's passengers is alive.
