Potato Plants Rogued Any diseased potato plants, sickly, weak or otherwise unsatisfactory, should be dug out, taken off the field and destroyed as promptly as they appear. If this measure is followed through the season it will help materially in preventing the spread of potato disease.

HIKE TO MT. ASHLAND




