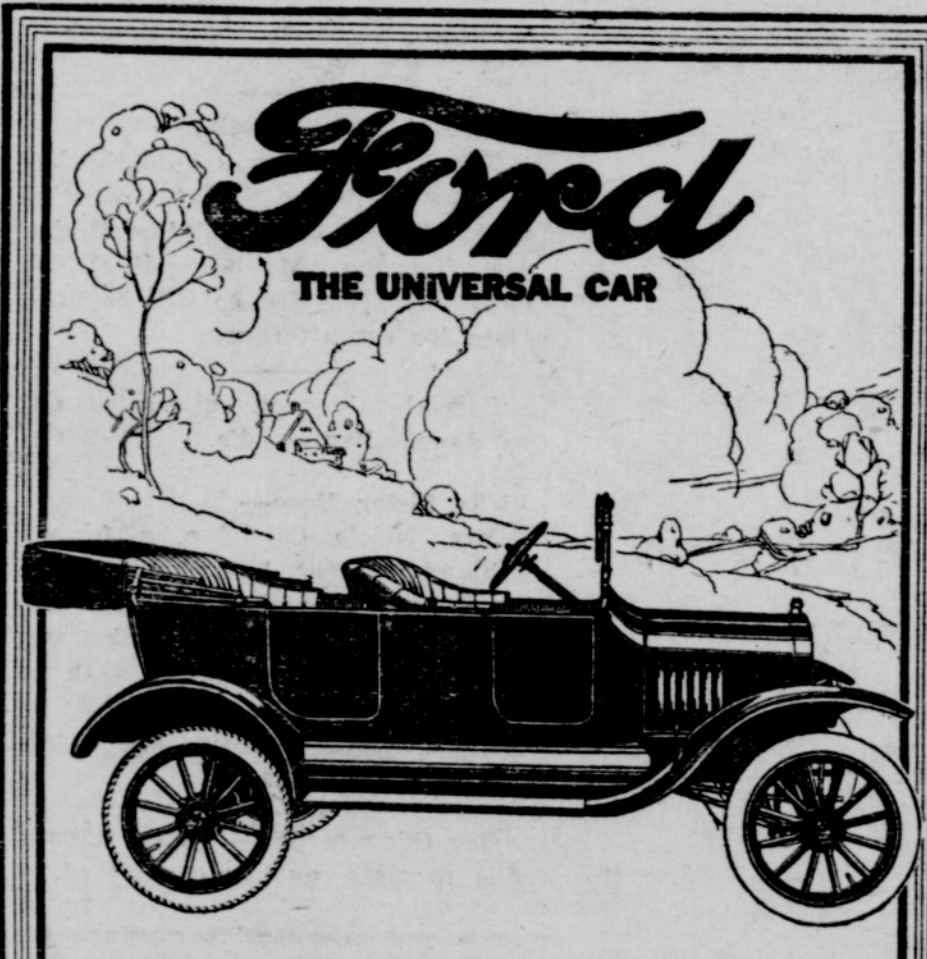
SLAYER OF GIRL GIVEN LIFE AT HARD LABOR
