President Harding, together with senators and representatives in congress from Iowa, have received copies of a resolution unanimously adopted at Davenport, Ia., by the Iowa Bankers' association, representing more than 1800 Iowa bankers, favoring immediate enactment of the American Legion's adjusted compensation bill now before the senate.

Especially equipped box cars, attached to passenger trains, will carry hundreds of members of the 40 Hommes et 8 Chevaux, the American Legion's playground society, to the annual promenade nationale of the organization to be held in conjunction with the national Legion convention in New Orleans, October 16 to 20.

Going on record as opposed to violations of the eighteenth amendment, the Omaha, Neb., American Legion at a special meeting voted to reprimand members who violate the amendment.

More than 250 American Legionnaires in Rhode Island are already making plans to attend the national Legion convention in New Orleans in October, Rhode Island Legion men will join with those of other New England states in chartering a steamship to take them to the old southern city.

As a monument to Michigan's war dead, the Michigan American Legion will build and equip a home for orphans of world war veterans. The Legion will raise the necessary funds without drawing from the public coffers.

Each Sunday one of the churches in Arco, Idaho, extends an invitation to the local post of the American Legion to use its sermon hour for a lecture on "Americanism."

The \$3463 left from a fund raised by the old Manhattan club of New York for the purpose of defense during the war, has been turned over to the New York American Legion to be used in building a veteran's tuberculosis camp in the Adirondack mountains.

WEATHER OUTLOOK

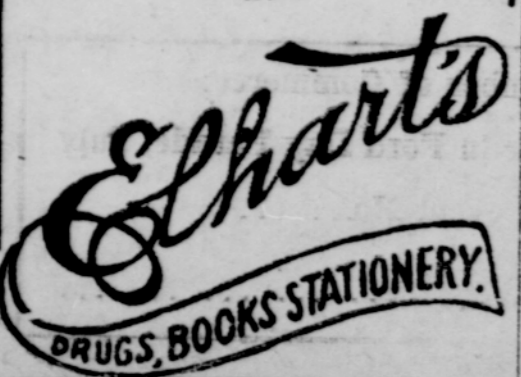

COUNTY INSTITUTE OF ROCKEFELLER FOUNDATION

The state board of health, in cooperation with the international board of health of the Rockefeller foundation, proposes to give financial aid to five counties in Oregon for the maintenance of a full-time county health department. It is expected that by the end of the first two years the department will be able to show such a decrease in the death rate in the five counties, that a desire for similar work will be created throughout the state. Such has been the result of this work in other states where the demonstration has been under way for several years.

There is no fixed time limit regarding this arrangement, although the financial aid from the Rockefeller Foundation is not a permanent gift to any one county. Each one of the five counties will operate on \$10,000 yearly. The Rockefeller Foundation and the state board of health contribute \$5580, leaving \$4420 to be paid by the county.

From this may be deducted the expense of our present county nurse, which is about \$2500. There is imperative need for a second county nurse, and her salary alone would be greater than the \$1920 left as the additional appropriation which must be raised by the county in order to get the benefit of the \$10,000 stipulated in the plan of the Rockefeller Foundation.

This annual budget of \$10,000 for each county will defray salary, traveling and contingent expenses of a staff of trained sanitarians, consisting of an experienced physician, two public health nurses and one laboratory assistant, all of whom will devote their full time to carrying out a definite and intensive program of work in co-operation with local physicians and health authorities.

The aim of this demonstration is to prevent sickness and therefore decrease the county death rate. The activities of each department embrace (1) child welfare work; (2) life extension; (3) the control of communicable diseases; (4) public health education; and (5) maintenance of a public health laboratory. There are 34 counties in Oregon, and Dr. Covington is now visiting a number of these to determine the five that will be best suited to the demonstration. Should Jackson county be successful in securing one of the five units it is proposed to retain Miss Faldine as a member of the staff, since her work has been so wholly satisfactory.

The committees appointed will bring the matter to the attention of the people throughout the county. The benefits of securing full-time health officers are so obvious that approval and co-operation are expected from every citizen who has the welfare of Jackson county at heart.

SHASTA OPPOSES UNMERGING OF TWO PACIFIC RAIL LINES

REDDING, CALIF., June 26.—The Redding chamber of commerce and Shasta County Promotion and Development association has adopted resolutions calling on the interstate commerce commission and the attorney general to find a way of forestalling the unmerging of the Southern Pacific and Central Pacific railways.
