BABY QUARTZ MILLS MAY GIVE BOOM TO MINING

Quartz mills which weigh only 1800 pounds in all and the heaviest part of which weigh but 125 pounds are now being manufactured by a Medford concern. The mill's are easily transportable and are especially adaptable to small quartz mines in the hills where about 10 men are employed.

They handle from 2½ to eight tons of ore in 10 hours, according to the nature of the ore, and are designed to be operated by a 2½ horse power engine. They are easily dismantled and set up, the process taking but half an hour. The mills are so constructed that they may be used either with water or without, and the ore can be pulverized to any desired degree. The price of one of these mills is equal to about one-fifth the cost of a regular two stamp mill.

Twelve of them are now under

construction by the Medford Iron Works and will be used by local mines.
