Don C. Wilson and a friend, both of whom are attending Oregon Agricultural college, were in the city Saturday en route to Tia Juana, Mexico, on a leisurely tour of the Pacific coast which will bring them back to Vancouver by September.

He was operating a kintotype at the time the war broke out, and following his release from the army, entered college and is making his way by operating the Penny Printery near the campus. He is known familiarly at school as "Penny."

He had Barnes' bum arm bottled up tight, and many thought the Nebraskan would not be able to stave off the Cottage Grove youth in the last 15 minutes because of the pain he was suffering, but the easterner went in again hammer and tongs fashion, and came near downing the Grove expert a couple of times.

Both men showed a brand of high class wrestling that should assure them matches with any one in the country.

Barnes requested a return match, but nothing definite was done.

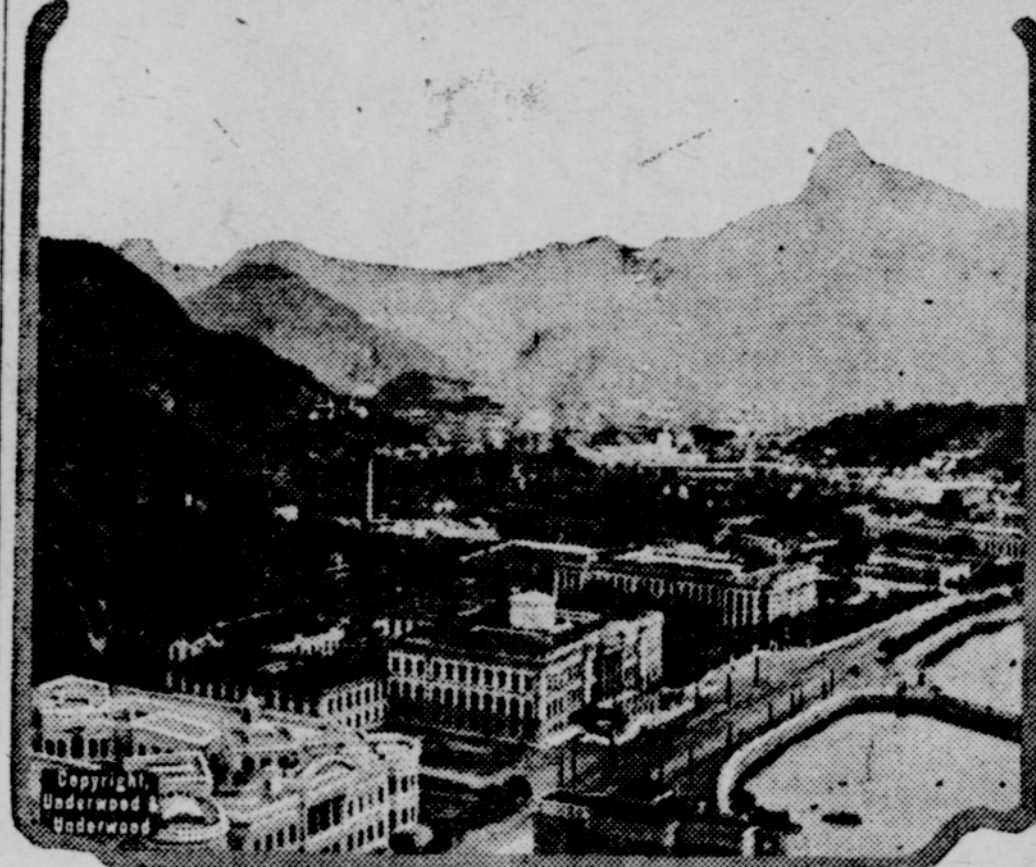
Motor Fuel From Weeds.

WRESTLING MATCH TO BE FOR WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

Ashland is indeed fortunate in obtaining a wrestling match of the caliber of the one scheduled here on July 3, when Walter Miller of Los Angeles, world's champion middleweight wrestler and holder of the Police Gazette belt, will defend his title against Ralph Hand, the Gold Hill challenger.

Miller won by the championship by defeating the world's champion middleweight wrestler and has successfully defended it a number of times, once against Hand at the Gold Hill arena, at which time he was given a run for his money. Since then Hand has met a number of good mat men and has developed additional skill, which it is expected will stand him in good stead next Monday evening, and may possibly acquire for him the world's championship in the middleweight class.

There are a great many wrestling fans in the Rogue river valley who attend all wrestling bouts that are staged in this vicinity, and it is thought there will be a large number of fans attend the coming bout from greater distances, inasmuch as the outcome may provide a new mat champion. It is seldom that a city the size of Ashland is able to land either a championship boxing or wrestling match, and it is expected that the largest crowd that ever witnessed a match of this kind in Oregon will be at the Armory Monday night. Local fans hope to see the Rogue river valley man come out of the tussle with the championship.

ELEVEN RESERVOIRS TO IRRIGATE LASSEN LANDS

SUSANVILLE, Calif., June 27.—The farmers of the Red Rock section have made all plans and arrangements for an irrigation district.

The district has a total of eleven reservoirs with a storage capacity of 118,000 acre feet of water. The largest of these reservoirs is the Cold Spring, with a capacity of 60,000 acre feet.

The engineering problems are simple and make it possible to place the water on the land at a cost of about \$15 per acre, exclusive of the sums spent for water rights and rights of way.

Twenty-five thousand acres have already been signed up under the project and comprises some of the best land in the district.

CHRONIC THIRST BRINGS THREE FINES IN A WEEK

OROVILLE, Calif., June 27.—Three times before the Oroville police court in one week, with a total payment of \$55 in fines, is the record against William McCreary, a laborer.

NEW RADIO FILTER A MARVEL

Campbell Device That Separates Telephone and Telegraph Messages.

Although much has been said and written about the remarkable filters employed by the telephone lines and by advanced radio workers for the separation of telephone and telegraph messages, says the Scientific American, it remained for Dr. Frank B. Jewett, chief engineer of the Western Electric company, to demonstrate how the filter permits of transmitting radio telephone and telegraph messages simultaneously, and of separating these messages at the receiving end, at a meeting of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers.

The present electrical filter is the invention of Dr. G. A. Campbell, a telephone engineer, and makes it possible to separate the various frequencies at which the individual telephone and telegraph messages are carried. The detected electrical current in a radio receiving set is passed through the filter which separates the frequencies of the telegraph message from those of the telephone.

The filter differs materially from the ordinary tuned circuits familiar to the radio enthusiast, since it separates not single frequencies but bands of frequencies of any predetermined width. The filter makes it possible to separate the band of frequencies comprising the telephone message from the band comprising the telegraph message. It can also separate one telephone message from another.

"Ground Antennae"

Some relief from bothersome radio "strays" in summertime can be obtained with sets having good amplifiers by using a "ground antennae." This is a long insulated wire run in a shallow trench or on the surface of the ground. The ground wire should be run in the direction of the station from which the most signals are to be received, and should preferably be several hundred feet long.

To Regulate Wave Lengths.

A variable condenser when properly connected in the antenna circuit may be used either to lengthen or shorten the wave length range. Besides this, the degree of regulation is much finer, for at best the loading coil can tune in only to within a single turn, if a loading coil of the tuning coil type is used.

Strange Friends.
It appears from the testimony of many naturalists that the lomelessness and atemesele beetles live in the nests of ants, much as cows live with man. On the sides of their abdomens they have many unicellular glands that secrete a fluid that the ants like as much as we like cows' milk. The beetles, however, have an independent standing in their adopted home and are rather friends and allies than domesticated animals, for they are quite capable of protecting themselves. Besides the fluid that the hosts like so well, the beetle can produce from other glands a fluid of most disagreeable odor, which stupefies the ants, and which it used whenever the ants become troublesome. In general, however, they apparently use it only against strange ants—the enemies of their hosts.
