Information Placard Informs Pat-

ons of Mail Distribution

(Klamath Falls Herald) No longer do post office patrons 216tf need-unless they lack eyesight-to wait uninformed in the lobby, while mail distribution is going on. Postmaster MsCall has arranged an incurtain. The idea, he says, is original, and he has been advised to get

> it patented. The curtain is fixed on the wall at the rear of the lobby. At the beginning of the distribution of mail it shows only sign No. 1: "Watch this curtain for report of the arrival of your mail. Be patient."

> After the clerks have finished the first round, this sign is hoisted to replace the other: "All Ashland stage mail is in your boxes."

Sign No. 3 is highly popular: Train on time

No. 4 is regretful but courteous: "Train late. When the mail reaches post office we will advise you."

No. 5 fulfills the preceding promise: "Train late. Mail being worked. Kindly be patient, quiet and courteous."

Signs are posted to save interference with busy workers. Hence No. 6's curt request: "Mail is being worked. Do not bother the clerks.' The information all are waiting for is contained in No. 7: "All daily papers and first-class mail are in

your boxes."

When the day's work is over and the foregoing signs have disappeared one by one, around the roller, this information is posted for the enlightment of the public, and remains until distribution begins next day:

"This post office is a business institution, not a loafing place. Please respect the premises and others who transact business here by orderly conduct and clean habits. No loiter- it securely and mail it early.
