TOURIST BUREAU PUBLICITY WORK FOR ALL OREGON

PORTLAND, July 12.—Literally thousands of tourists are availing themselves monthly of the free tourist information service of the Oregon Tourist and Information bureau, which maintains in addition to the main office in Portland, five branch bureaus in as many sections of the state. The branch offices are located at Medford, Bend, Klamath Falls, Pendleton and Ontario.

The bureau has had printed for free distribution this season, 175,000 road maps covering Oregon, Washington, California and Idaho. Of this number fully 100,000 have already been distributed. The bureau also has for distribution maps and literature covering not only the various sections of Oregon, but carries maps and data covering Yellowstone Park, Rainier National Park, Glacier National Park, the Yosemite, and other attractions, and is in position generally to direct tourists to any section of the country.

The bureau this season enlarged its activities by the erection of pictorial signs covering various scenic spots of Oregon. The signs, which are painted in the highest type of the sign painter's art, are ten feet high and 50 feet long. One sign located on the most traveled road near Los Angeles, shows Crater Lake in all its magnificence; the Oregon Caves, with their splendid mystery, are displayed on the "Coast" road connecting San Francisco and Los Angeles, and is located near Belmont; the Columbia River highway is shown on a sign erected on the Yellowstone Trail east of Spokane, and a picture of Mount Hood in its snowy splendor is shown on the Yellowstone Trail east of Walla Walla; the Blue and Wallowa mountains of eastern Oregon are shown as the "American Alps" on the Lincoln highway east of Salt Lake, and Wallowa lake is shown on the main traveled highway east of Pocatello, Idaho.

The bureau keeps in close touch with road conditions throughout the state, and with roads in adjoining states approaching Oregon. The bureau also receives reports covering road conditions in other states and several of the transcontinental highways. The bureau keeps in close touch with chambers of commerce and other sources of tourist and road information.

Travel to the Pacific coast states

from the east this season is somewhat later than last year, due to the fact that throughout the coast region and middle west, the roads were late in opening, due to the heavy falls of snow in the mountains last winter. Even in California, travel to the Yosemite, Lake Tahoe and other mountain resorts started later than for several previous years.

Crater Lake travel is just beginning. The roads have been blocked with snow until recently, but indications are that the season will be productive of a large volume of business for that resort. The completion of the new road to the Oregon Caves, which has just been announced, will result in a heavy travel to those remarkable phenomena of nature. The bureau, anticipating the completion of the road for this season's travel, is advertising the caves in California.

INTERESTING EXHIBIT AT OVERLAND SHOE SHOP

An interesting exhibit has been on display for some time at the Overland shoe shop at the corner of Oak and Main streets, consisting of various articles carved by hand from wood. The articles are the property of C. C. Weisenburger, who made them when a young man while he was working in the timber near Forest City, Calif., taking this method of whiling away his idle hours.

In the collection is a lady's work box, which though quite small, is composed of 3000 pieces of wood. It is something any lady would be delighted to receive as a present. A tatting shuttle of the usual size is made of 110 pieces so interwoven as to make a beautiful piece of work. "Five-in-one" might be a good name for another piece of work in the shape of five sets of pliers which were made from one stick of wood without being cut apart. A box without nails or glue is also on display. As something out of the ordinary it would give a carpenter or cabinet-maker room for thought. The box is dovetailed together, and the ordinary person would be at a loss to understand the process.

Another stick of wood was transformed into a round ball within four pillars, the work on the ball all being done within the pillars. The ball is of such size it would be impossible to remove from within the pillars

UNDER STRIKE CONDITIONS BEST EXPLAINED BY CHAIRMAN BEN W. HOOPER OF THE UNITED STATES RAILROAD LABOR BOARD IN HIS STATEMENT OF JULY 1ST, READING AS FOLLOWS

"In this case the conflict is not between the employer and the oppressed employee. The people of this country, through an act of congress, signed by President Wilson, established a tribunal to decide such disputes over wages and working conditions, which are submitted to it in a proper manner. It is the decision of this tribunal against which the shop crafters are striking. "Regardless of any question of the right of the men to strike, the men who take the strikers' places are merely accepting the wages and working conditions prescribed by a government tribunal and are performing a public service. They are not accepting the wages and working conditions which an employer is trying to impose. For this reason public sentiment and full government power will protect the men who remain in their positions and new men who may come in."

Adequate provisions have been made for the full protection of all new employees, the same as old employees who have remained loyally at work. Applicants should apply to the office of the superintendent at Portland (Union station), or to the assistant superintendent at Roseburg.
