

STRIKEBREAKERS ARE ATTACKED BY MASKED MOB

SLEEPING MEN IN OROVILLE YARDS SET UPON AND BEATEN

Pitched Battle Is Fought and Railroad Guards Are Overpowered—Attackers Fled in Autos Without Leaving Any Clues.

OROVILLE, Calif., July 14.—An armed attack by force of 100 men, many of them masked, on the round house and shops of the Western Pacific railroad here, the clubbing of strikebreakers as they slept, and a pitched battle with guards in the railroad yards for several hours after midnight, left Oroville with its first strike horror of the shop crafts walkout.

From accounts of the attack and fighting reaching authorities here, only the matter of blind luck prevented a death toll of proportions to shock the nation. Complete results of the affair were not checked up, but at noon one man was in a local hospital, one guard was still reported missing, and many of the strikebreakers were nursing cuts and bruises.

The attackers left Oroville immediately after the attack in automobiles.

8000 OILERS AND FIREMEN ORDERED TO QUIT WORK

CHICAGO, July 14.—All railroad stationary oilers and firemen all over the United States were telegraphed orders to suspend work at 8 o'clock Monday, July 17, by President Healy of the Brotherhood of Stationary Firemen and Oilers.

This strike order, which calls out an important factor in the railroad powerhouses, is expected to have a far-reaching effect upon the ultimate result of the strike. Eight thousand men are effected.

DYNAMITE EXPLOSION KILLS NON-UNION WORKMAN

CHARLESTON, W. Va., July 14.—Henry McAuers, a non-union miner, was instantly killed and ten others injured, four of them seriously when a truck train going to the non-union mountain mines at Mordau, near here, was blown up by dynamite.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC SEEKS INJUNCTION OF STRIKERS

SACRAMENTO, July 14.—The Southern Pacific company, through its attorneys, Guy V. Shoup and William H. Devlin, today filed a petition in the federal court here asking that the striking shopmen be enjoined from interfering with the operation of shops and trains in Superior California.

As there is no federal judge here today, hearing upon the petition will be held at San Francisco.

ADMINISTRATION IN QUANDRY ON STRIKE SITUATION

WASHINGTON, July 14.—For more than two hours today, President Harding and his cabinet discussed in detail the acute situation caused by the combination coal and rail strike. It is believed a definite policy has been decided upon to effect a settlement of the increasingly menacing railway situation.

It was apparent, however, that the pessimism revealed earlier in the day, had not been dissipated to any appreciable degree by the cabinet session.

MASKED MEN CRIPPLE SMALL WAGON MINE

BONNEVILLE, Ind., July 14.—Twenty-five masked men appeared at a small wagon mine near here and damaged mine property so that work will be suspended for some time.

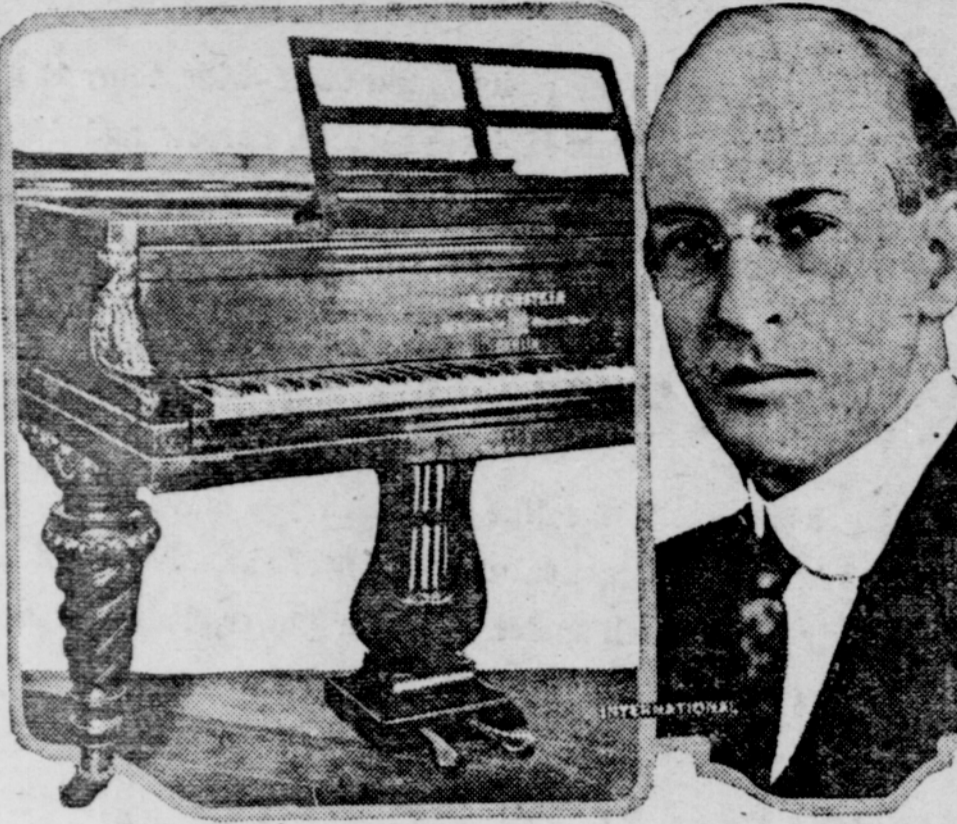
ARTILLERY SENT TO PROTECT R. R. PROPERTY IN ARKANSAS

TRIES TO SLAY PRESIDENT AND FRENCH PREMIER

MILLERAND AND POINCARÉ UN-INJURED, BUT WOMAN IS WOUNDED

Were Returning From Races in Automobile, When Assassin Fired From Ambush—Secretary of Anarchist Society Under Arrest.

PARIS, July 14.—An unsuccessful attempt was made yesterday afternoon to assassinate President Millerand, of the French republic, and Premier Poincaré. The secretary of the Paris Society of Anarchists was arrested and charged with the crime.

Millerand and Poincaré were returning from the races at Longchamps to Paris in an automobile. The would-be assassin had hidden himself along the road and fired at them with a revolver. Both escaped but one bullet struck and wounded a woman.

PORTLAND TOURISTS STOP LONG ENOUGH TO MARRY

OUSTED FROM BERTH IN PULLMAN TO COUNTY JAIL

OROVILLE, Calif., July 14.—Deputy Sheriff William Fitch, of Oroville, received a telegram from Quincy Tuesday night, asking that he arrest Charles Van Pelt, who was wanted in the Plumas county capital on a charge of stealing about \$100 at that place.

On the arrival of westbound Western Pacific passenger train the next morning, officers found their man occupying a berth in one of the pullman cars.

He was made to dress quickly and was hurried to the county jail. It was found that he had in his possession about \$150 in bills.

COTERIE OF BOYS HELD IN SANGER MURDER MYSTERY

FRESNO, Calif., July 14.—Two boys, said by Sheriff Jones to have been identified by Sanger girls as the possessors of a flashlight found near the body of Miss Pauline Grass, who, with Alex Winter, a Sanger youth, was mysteriously murdered on Sunday night near Sanger, are being investigated by Sheriff Jones and District Attorney Gearhart, at Parlier, a few miles from Sanger.

Five other youths are also being investigated by sheriff's deputies.

OLCOTT'S LEGAL ADVISERS CONSIDER HALL CONTEST

PORTLAND, July 14.—Attorneys for Governor Ben W. Olcott are in session here to consider legal phases of the petition filed in Marion county on behalf of Charles Hall, candidate for the republican nomination for governor in the state primary in May, contesting the nomination of Governor Olcott. Whether a technical legal reply is to be made, or whether an attack shall be made on the alleged facts set forth in the complaint was the main question to be decided.

WOMAN JUDGE JOLTS MAN-WIFE FOR BOOTLEGGING

REDDING, Calif., July 14.—The only woman judge in Shasta county, Ethel Blair, had two alleged bootleggers before her yesterday, and she handed them a hard jolt. They were man and wife and had been caught redhanded selling moonshine in a hotel which they conduct at Middle Creek.

In the case of Rudolph Friebe, she imposed a fine of \$500 and six months in jail, and also sentenced his wife to six months. The jail sentences were suspended on the promise of the pair that they would not offend again, and Friebe paid the \$500 fine.

MISSIONARY SOCIETY HAS MEETING IN PARK

The Baptist Missionary society met the first of the week at the picnic grounds in Lithia park and quite an enjoyable afternoon was spent. Dr. Mattie Shaw gave a talk on missionary work in Coos county, where she lived for a number of years, and spoke from first-hand information. Mrs. H. O. Butterfield spoke on what is being done for the Americanization of foreigners who arrive at Ellis Island. Both speakers were highly instructive, and the ladies present went home feeling they had been greatly benefitted.

63 CONVICTS PUT TO WORK ON SHASTA RIVER HIGHWAY

HORN BROOK, Calif., July 14.—The first consignment of convicts for Beaver camp, the convict road camp, has arrived at Hornbrook. There are 63 convicts, and they were brought from Ingot, where a convict road camp had been maintained for the past year.

They will at once be set to work constructing the permanent highway, which begins at the mouth of the Shasta river and extends to Happy Camp.

COURT RETURNS TAX MONEY TO COPPER COMPANIES

REDDING, Calif., July 14.—The supervisors yesterday directed Auditor Shuffleton to draw warrants in favor of the Mountain Copper company for \$16,410, and in favor of the Balaklala Copper company for \$5877.44. These sums satisfy judgments the companies got in the United States circuit court in March 1921, for taxes paid under protest in 1919.

FORDSON POWER EXPOSITION IS IN FULL SWING

The Ford and Fordson power exposition is now in full swing and everything is going along smoothly and just as planned. The outfit pitched camp last night on the lot adjoining the Lithia garage, opposite the lower park, and after washing up and cooling off from the long grind down from Portland, they were all on the job in the evening to demonstrate and talk of the various mechanical contrivances which form the exposition. There is a specialist to demonstrate each line.

The lighting system used is manufactured by the Delco Lighting company. It furnishes electricity for the entire caravan.

The disc plow, spike tooth harrow and cultipacker were being operated this morning on the other side of Stratton place on the other side of Bear creek. The 16-inch plow and the Ersted hoist were busily engaged near Jackson hot springs. Both were doing fine work, and should be seen and appreciated by every farmer.

The power mower was in operation at the George Irwin place in the lower part of the city this morning, and this afternoon is working at the Anderson place, and will be taken from there to the Sheets place near Talent.

The spray pump was being demonstrated this afternoon in the park, where it was giving absolute satisfaction.

The dump bodies were being demonstrated this afternoon by the White Transfer company, which was using the trucks to haul coal in instead of their regular trucks.

One of the light delivery trucks was used to haul all the mail to and from the trains today, being just what is needed for such purposes.

The city light department was using one of the stake truck bodies for their work, and employees say it is equal to anything they ever used.

Moving pictures are on the program for tonight, and efforts are being made to get the radio in working condition. Talks will also be given during the evening telling of what has been done today and giving the cost of operation.

BOOTLEG FINES SHOW PROFIT OVER DRY EXPENSES

RED BLUFF, Calif., July 14.—As evidence the county has not lost money through prosecution of bootleggers and moonshiners in the last fiscal year, District Attorney M. J. Cheatham today obtained figures from the county auditor's office, showing a total of \$5251.50 was collected from this source alone. Of this amount, he said, only about \$500 was received from cases other than fines for infraction of the dry laws or actions growing out of liquor law violations.

Cheatham recently filed a yearly report of the expenditures for securing evidence against bootleggers and moonshiners, which aggregated \$2871.42. This left a balance of \$2380.08, which the district attorney termed the county's profit.

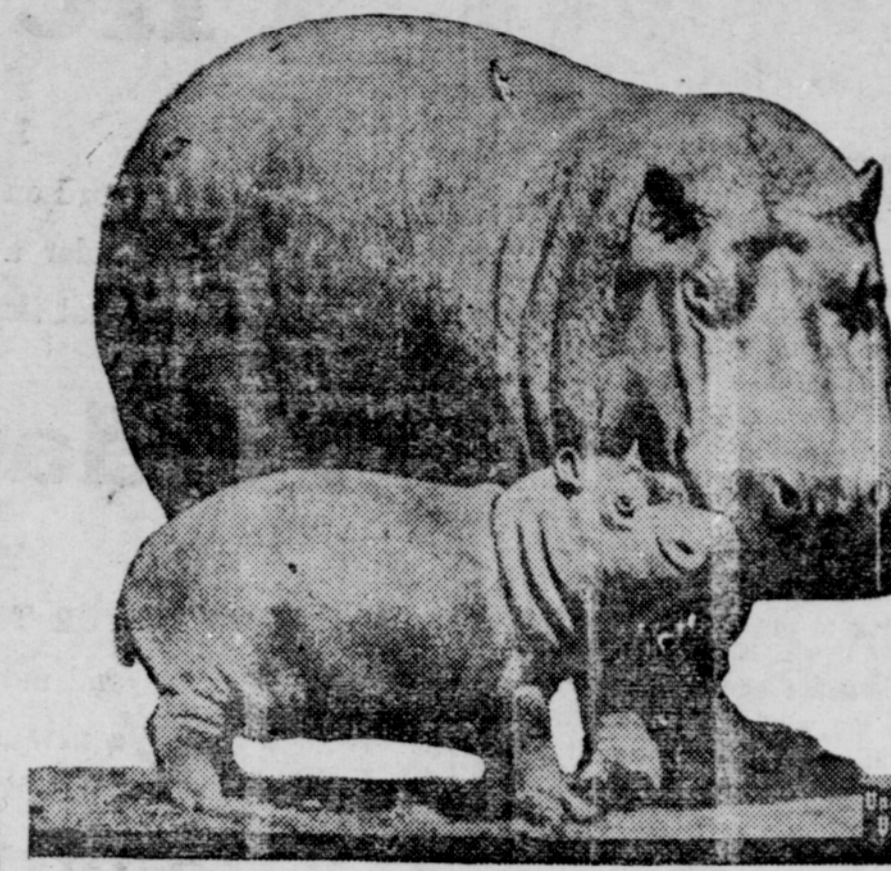

HUSBAND TELLS STORY OF HIS WIFE'S CRIME

CONFESSED TO HIM SHE HAD MURDERED HIS ALLEGED PARAMOUR

Mrs. Phillips Indicted By Grand Jury Is Taken Into Custody in Arizona Whither He Had Sent Her After Her Confession.

LOS ANGELES, July 14.—The grand jury has indicted Mrs. A. L. Phillips, charged with the murder of Mrs. Alberta Meadows. Mrs. Phillips was arrested in Tucson, Ariz., last night.

Her husband in a statement to the local officials, declared that his wife believed the neighborhood gossip that he and Mrs. Meadows, whose husband was killed last January, were intimate. This Phillips denied.

He declared that after purchasing the hammer with which she later murdered her victim, Mrs. Phillips asked Mrs. Meadows to take her in the Meadows car for a ride. After reaching a lonesome spot, Mrs. Phillips suggested they get out. According to the husband's story, she accused Mrs. Meadows of intimacy with her husband. This was denied and a fight followed, in which Mrs. Phillips beat the other woman to death with the hammer, returning to the city in the dead woman's car. Mrs. Phillips confessed, he stated. Phillips said he borrowed money from a friend and sent his wife away.

WOULD CURTAIL EASY DIVORCES IN NEVADA

RENO, Nev., July 14.—An initiative petition sponsored by Bishop George Hunting of the Episcopal church of Nevada, has been filed with the secretary of state and will be submitted to the electors at the November elections.

It provides that divorce seekers may obtain an interlocutory decree after residing in Nevada for six consecutive months, but must wait another six months before securing the final decree.

It is certain that the Bishop Hunting measure will be bitterly fought by the business interests of Reno and Las Vegas, but it will be supported by other powerful elements of the people.

LOWE PETITION WILL BE FILED ON SATURDAY

ENDORSEMENT MISTAKEN BY OFFICIALS FOR NOMINATING PETITION

Specific Acts Are Charged Against Sheriff Terrill in the Petition Nominating D. M. Lowe, Who Announces His Platform.

The petition for the nomination of D. M. Lowe as an opponent for Sheriff Terrill at the recall election to be held August 2, will be filed with the county clerk tomorrow morning, the requisite number of signatures having been obtained. There is already a petition on file, which the sponsors say is simply an endorsement of Lowe's candidacy, and not a petition for his nomination. This is the petition to which the county clerk referred when he declined to accept it as a nominating petition. Under the law, the sponsors of the recall have until Tuesday, July 18th, to file the nominating petition, which is as follows:

Nominating Petition
To Chauncey Florey, clerk of the county of Jackson, state of Oregon, and to the electors of said Jackson county, Oregon:

I, D. M. Lowe, reside at Medford, Jackson county, Oregon, and my post office address is R. F. D. No. 4, Box 90; I am a legal voter of the county of Jackson, state of Oregon.

If I am nominated for the office of sheriff, to be voted on at the recall election to be held in Jackson county, on Saturday, July 29, 1922, I will accept the nomination and will not withdraw; if I am elected, I will qualify for such office.

I stand for the strict enforcement of the prohibition law and of all of the laws of the county of Jackson, the state of Oregon, and the United States.

Dated at Medford this 17th day of July 1922.

Endorsing Lowe

The petition of recommendation or endorsement of Lowe's candidacy, to which is attached the findings of the last grand jury in connection with the conduct of the sheriff's office, now on file in the county clerk's office, is in part as follows:

"Petitioners do respectfully demand the recall of C. E. Terrill as sheriff of Jackson county, Oregon, for the reason that he is inefficient and fails to give proper consideration to the public interest of Jackson county, Oregon, in permitting bootlegging to be carried on in Jackson county, Oregon, and in obstructing the enforcement of the prohibition laws of this state and of the United States. His inefficiency in this respect has necessitated the employment of special officers to enforce said laws, and has been costing the county about \$1000 per month and for the balance of the term of said C. E. Terrill would cost the county more than \$25,000 at the same rate.

"A grand jury of Jackson county, Oregon, has expressed its opinion that the sheriff is far from doing his duty, if not deliberately allowing wrongdoers to escape the consequences."
