CLASSY CARD STAGED FOR MEDFORD BOUT

There's some class to the attraction which Manager Brown has secured for the fistic carnival scheduled for Thursday night at the Medford athletic club. Gordon McKay, who meets Wildcat Welty, of Idaho, is the simon-pure middleweight champion of the Pacific coast, who is booked to battle Harry Greb in Pittsburg, Pa., on Labor day. It will be recalled that an effort was made to secure Dempsey for the go with Greb, but the champion had already signed up for a bout with Lloyd Fitzsimmons in Michigan.

McKay, with his family and trainer, Rodey Stange, are camping on the Green Springs road, proceeding by easy stages to the battle ground in Pittsburg, which they expect to reach by Labor day. The middleweight champion, who gained his laurels by defeating Battling Oreaga of Oakland, Calif., is an old friend of "Knockout" Bob Brown, who is managing the Medford athletic club. To accommodate the latter he consented to take on Welty, whom he has met before in Idaho. Incidentally "Knockout" Brown has had a sample of McKay's wares, as he got a draw with him two years ago.

McKay is a dangerous opponent for any fighter, and has met some of the best in the country. He has fought twice with the redoubtable Mike Gibbons, once to a draw and once he was given the decision. He is also credited with a decision over Jack Britton, the welterweight champion. Immediately after his bout on Thursday night at Medford, he will motor to Oakland, where he is billed for a battle with Panama Joe Gans.

FERRAND HEARING AT REDDING FRIDAY

REDDING, Calif., July 18.—The preliminary examination of N. J. Ferrand, driver of the Pickwick stage that was wrecked, killing three passengers, will be resumed Friday morning. It is expected that by that time the bench warrant will find Mrs. Hattie Seney, the complainant and bring her into court. She is in Pomona or Anaheim. 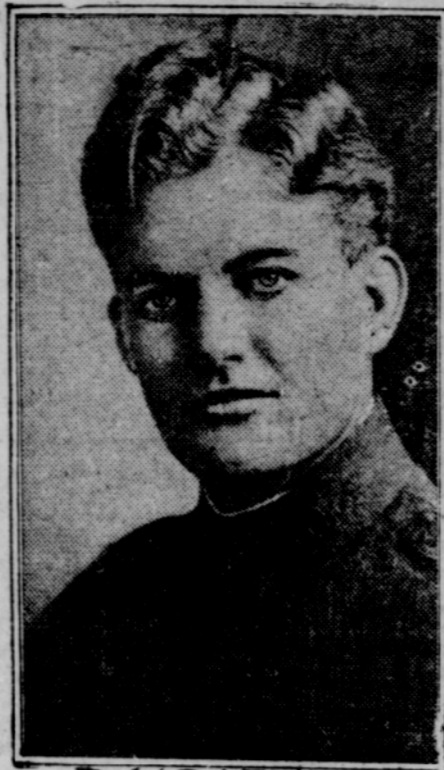
LAD DIES AT HOME OF PARENTS NEAR TALENT

Stranded Florida Flyer Lives on Grasshoppers

TAMPA, Fla., July 18.—Losing his sense of direction while flying 4000 feet in the air, Cadet R. A. White was compelled to alight when his gasoline tank went dry.

His plane, in which he was flying from Okeechobee City, Florida, to Carlstrom field, descended in the Florida Everglades, miles from civilization. For two days he marched through the swamps, often in mud knee deep, he declares, making many detours to avoid alligators and snakes.

Driven to desperation by hunger, the flyer was compelled to subsist on grasshoppers until finally found by a Seminole Indian boy, who guided him back to civilization.

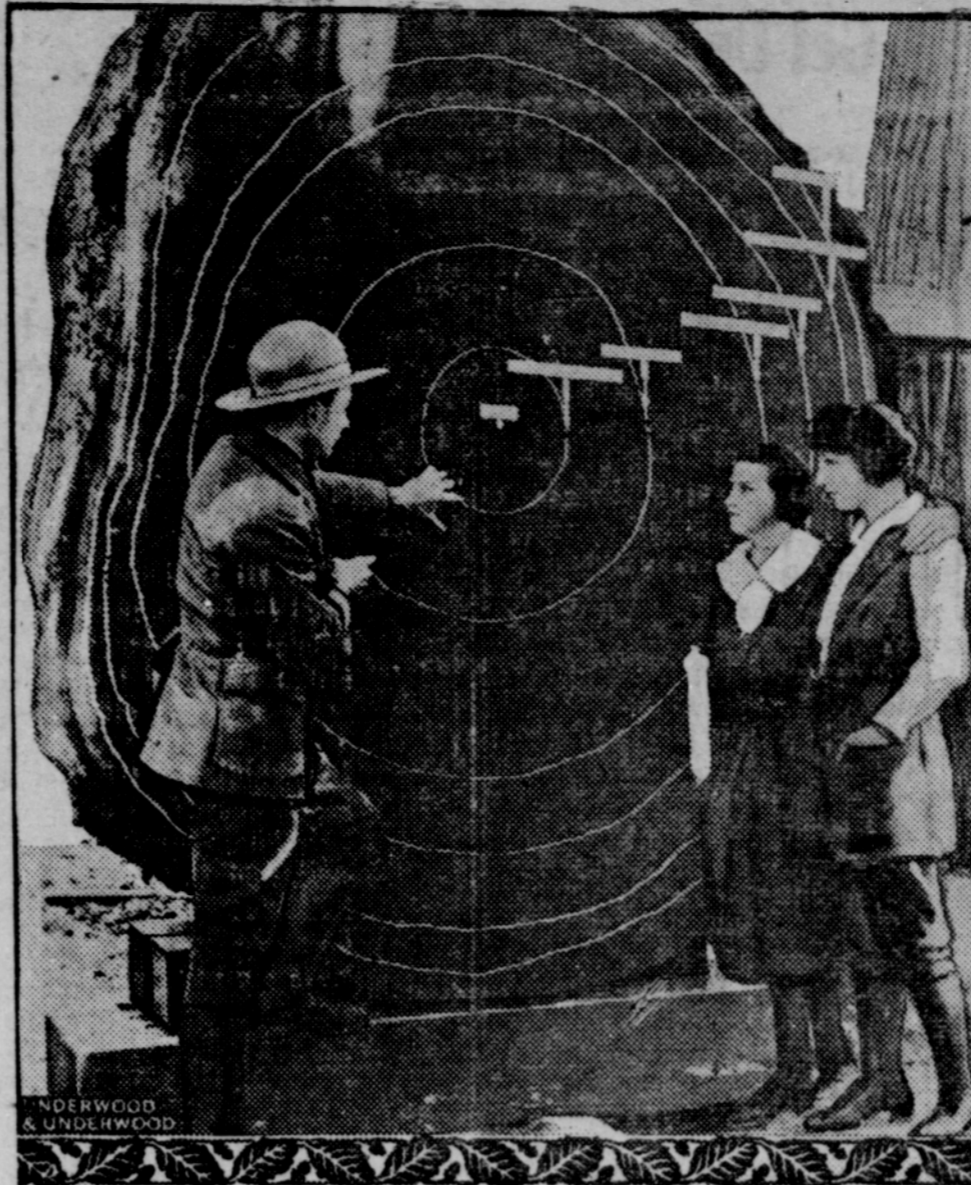
While he was undergoing these experiences, airplanes from Carlstrom field, Arcadia, Florida, and Montgomery, Alabama, circled the territory in which he was believed to be, combing the Everglades and swampy region from above. They finally located him after he had been rescued and while being taken in an automobile from the Carlson cattle ranch towards Immokalee.

Although ill from drinking swamp water and his face swollen by mosquito bites, he remained in the field hospital only one day, then declared his intention of making another practice flight from Carlstrom field to Okeechobee City and return. Cadet White's home is in Pritchett, Texas.

History Recorded in Tree's Rings

Notice to Water Users

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED that on and after July 19, 1922 the City of Ashland will be divided into two districts, Upper and Lower, for irrigation purposes, the dividing line being the Boulevard and Main streets.

UPPER DISTRICT

That portion of the city lying above the Boulevard and Main streets to be known as the Upper District, will be allowed to use the water for irrigation and sprinkling purposes on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, from 5 a. m. to 10 a. m. and from 5 p. m. to 10 p. m., and on Sundays from 5 a. m. to 10 a. m.

LOWER DISTRICT

That portion of the city lying below the Boulevard and Main streets, to be known as the Lower District, will be allowed to use the water for irrigation and sprinkling purposes on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, from 5 a. m. to 10 a. m. and from 5 p. m. to 10 p. m., and on Sundays from 5 p. m. to 10 p. m.

The use of water through meters will not be under these restrictions.

Public parks in their respective districts will irrigate between the hours of 10 a. m. and 5 p. m.

Water must be turned off immediately in case of fire. Do not use open hose or open faucet where you are paying for 10,000 or 20,000 square feet. Use either spray nozzle or hose with nozzle not more than 1/4 inch in diameter.

Do not set sprinkler so it will interfere with traffic on sidewalk. Do not have leaky faucets, toilets or fixtures on your premises. Do not allow water to run off your property on the streets, gutters or alleys.

Do not run water at night between the hours of 10 p. m. and 5 a. m. in either division. By order of the Common Council.
