OBITUARY

Mrs. J. K. Helman was born in Wood county, Ohio, September 5, 1863, and lived there until she was a young woman, making her home in Akron and Cleveland, Ohio.

Mrs. Helman's mother was left a widow, and in 1884, it was decided that she and her children would go west, and they came as far west as the railroad would bring them at that time.

Mrs. Helman came of revolutionary stock, and inherited their strength of character and fortitude. During all the trials of life, she met and conquered her problems with a quiet strength.

She was a member of the Methodist church in Ashland for 38 years, and a constant worker in every branch. She was a life member of the Foreign Missionary society, and one of the oldest members in the city.

Her maiden name was Grace Arilla Younker, and she was married to John K. Helman, May 9, 1886, to which union two daughters were born, one of whom died as a very small child.

Funeral services were held Monday, July 17, 1922, from the Methodist church, and she was laid to rest in the family lot in the Ashland cemetery.



SALEM, July 19.—That the "appraisal by the appraisers is merely advisory in character and not binding on the commission," was the decision handed down by Judge John H. Rand, of the supreme court in handing down his opinion of the suit brought by the American Legion post here against the world war veterans state aid commission.

In handing down its opinion, the court reverses the decision of the circuit court, which upheld the ex-service men, by issuing the writ of mandamus asked for in the suit.

"The theory upon which the writ was issued," says Judge Rand in his opinion, "was that the appraisers and not the commission, were the final judges of the value of the property and that in absence of fraud their appraisal was binding upon the commission."

With this theory we cannot agree. In the absence of some statutory direction indicating that such was the intent of the legislature that appraisers appointed by and answerable to, and removable at the pleasure of the commission, should have the power to override the judgment of the commission upon so important a question as this does not seem to us to be a fair construction to be placed upon the act.

There was no allegation in the writ of bad faith or abuse of discretion by the commission, or that the commission was acting beyond its powers, and as a mandamus will not lie to control the discretion of the commission while

acting within its authorized powers, the demurrer should have been sustained. "For these reasons, the order appealed from must be reversed."
