WOULD SHOOT E. A. FLEMING

It is a current rumor on the streets that the opposition intends to publish counter-affidavits to contradict those now being published. Does a man as well and favorably known as D. R. Hill LIE UNDER OATH? He, under oath, makes the following statement:

AFFIDAVIT (Copy)

State of Oregon, County of Jackson—ss.

I, D. R. Hill, being first duly sworn on oath, depose and say: That I am a citizen of the state of Oregon, residing in Jackson county, for the past 37 years; that I was present at the county jail of said county at Jacksonville, Oregon, on the evening of Thursday, May the 25th, 1922, when a number of citizens appeared there for the purpose of securing the release of Elmer Simmons, who was arrested and brought from the state of California, by C. E. WAS HE INTOXICATED?

The following is just another of a number of affidavits that were not sworn to before the grand jury of Jackson county, Oregon, in regard to its report of February 26, 1922, but is additional evidence to their statement of the charge of malfeasance, of office:

AFFIDAVIT (Copy)

State of Oregon, County of Jackson—ss.

I, Wilbur F. Jordan, being first duly sworn, depose and say: That on the 3d day of December, A. D. 1921, I attended a dance at the Kingsbury Springs dance hall, Kingsbury Springs, Jackson county, Oregon, and that while there I saw C. E. Terrill, sheriff of Jackson county, Oregon, there, and that at times I was right beside said C. E. Terrill, and that to the best of my knowledge and belief said C. E. Terrill was in an intoxicated condition, and that while I was beside him I did smell liquor on his breath, that his face was in a flushed condition, that he was in a very talkative mood, that he took a seat amongst the ladies, and was ungentlemanly enough to hold said seat to the exclusion of the ladies, that his actions were those of a person in an intoxicated condition, and that personally I did not see said C. E. Terrill at any time drink liquor.

Weaving and Spinning.

It is likely that the art of weaving, in its most elementary form, was practiced long before men abandoned the use of animal skins for clothing, or perhaps even before they adopted clothing at all. SUCCESS OF "SILENT NINE"

By Its Use Airplane Passengers Are Enabled Freely to Converse With Each Other.

A silent airplane engine has at last been invented.

In a recent test the deafening roar of the engine and exhaust was completely eliminated when fitted with the "Silent Nine," as the new invention is called.

Passengers will now be able to converse with ease while in the air, and not be forced to shout at the top of their voices.

The "Silent Nine" is very simple in construction and in principle, says London Answers. It consists of an expansion chamber fitted to the end of a long exhaust pipe, and arranged in such a way that the gases from the engine are cooled immediately they leave the red-hot exhaust hole. This is the secret of engine silence.

The inventor is Major Grant, the superintendent of the Crocydon air-drome depot.

One "Silent Nine" can be sold at a profit for less than \$10 (\$50), and already there is a great demand for it.
