Charles A. Eliason died at his home on Laurel street at 5:45 this morning, following an illness of three weeks. Mr. Eliason had been in his usual state of health until the latter part of June, when he was taken ill, and it was feared from the first that he would not survive. However, his condition had improved considerably and the first of the week, he was able to sit up in an easy chair, but he took a change for the worse and lost consciousness during the early part of last night.

Mr. Eliason was 75 years old. He was born in the state of West Virginia, where he entered the oil fields, becoming an expert driller, and was often conferred with in regard to oil wells in the west.

He moved to Ashland with his family 25 years ago, and has lived here continually since that time, and had a host of friends among the older people of the city.

He leaves to mourn his loss, besides his wife, two sons and two daughters. The sons are Lars and Ross Eliason, both of whom are located in Alberta, Canada, and the daughters are Miss Bertha Eliason, of Portland, and Mrs. George N.

Kramer, of Ashland. Funeral arrangements will not be completed until word is received from the sons in Canada. J. P. Dodge and Sons will have charge of the funeral.
