Does Not Believe In Enforcement

While sitting in the police station on or about the first of June, 1921, in conversation with Mr. Terrill about the enforcement of the prohibition law, Mr. Terrill remarked to me that he did not believe in the enforcement of the prohibition law, as the prohibition law was not popular with the public.

Of course, if the above affidavit is true, along with the grand jury's report to the governor, that is the reason that he, the governor, sent down one of his special officers to enforce the law in Jackson county, and enforce the law did this man Sandifer do, as his record will show. Without aid from the sheriff's office, Mr. Sandifer has been able to pay his own salary and his deputies, and have a surplus left in the county treasury, as the records of the justice court and the circuit court will show. If the sheriff had done as well as this man Sandifer has done he would have added nearly \$1000 a month to the county treasury, instead of having a majority of it go out to pay Sandifer's salary and his deputies. Later the figures will be given substantiating this statement, that Sandifer has better than paid his salary and his deputies out of fines he has secured, as well as getting a conviction twice against one man and one against another who have appealed their cases to the supreme court. If elected Mr. Lowe states over his signature, that among the other enforcements of the law, "HE WILL STAND FOR THE STRICT ENFORCEMENT OF THE PROHIBITION LAW," which of course means that if Mr. Lowe does as well as this man Sandifer has done, "HE WILL BE ABLE IN LESS THAN FIVE MONTHS TO PAY THE EXPENSE OF THIS SPECIAL ELECTION AND IN THE INTERVENING TWO YEARS THAT
