UNDER STRIKE CONDITIONS BEST EXPLAINED BY CHAIRMAN BEN W. HOOPER OF THE UNITED STATES RAILROAD LABOR BOARD IN HIS STATEMENT OF JULY 1ST, READING AS FOLLOWS

"In this case the conflict is not between the employer and the oppressed employe. The people of this country, through an act of congress, signed by President Wilson, established a tribunal to decide such disputes over wages and working conditions, which are submitted to it in a proper manner. It is the decision of this tribunal against which the shop craft are striking.

"Regardless of any question of the right of the men to strike, the men who take the strikers' places are merely accepting the wages and working conditions prescribed by a government tribunal and are performing a public service. They are not accepting the wages and working conditions which an employer is trying to impose. For this reason public sentiment and full government power will protect the men who remain in their positions and new men who may come in."

Adequate provisions have been made for the full protection of all new employes, the same as old employes who have remained loyally at work. Applicants should apply to the office of the superintendent at Portland (Union station), or to the assistant superintendent at Roseburg.

Was His Deputy Intoxicated?

AFFIDAVIT (COPY)

STATE OF OREGON, } ss. County of Jackson.

I, R. J. SCHRADER, being first duly sworn, on oath, depose and say: That I am over 21 years of age, and that during the winter of the years A. D. 1920 and 1921, while I was in the Medford, Oregon, City Police Force, I met there a man named "Wiltse," whom C. E. Terrill, Sheriff of Jackson County, Oregon, told me he had hired to catch the "bootleggers," and that he, C. E. Terrill, was going to give Wiltse some of the confiscated whiskey, out of the Jackson County jail strong room, in order that Wiltse could have something to work with, and that he, C. E. Terrill, did give Wiltse a deputy's star and took him over to the county jail at Jacksonville, Oregon, and got about three pints of whiskey for him; that J. J. McMahon, formerly deputy sheriff of Jackson County, and Chas. Adams, Medford city policeman, both know of this occurrence, and can testify to the same; that I believe this happened to the best of my knowledge and belief, on a Saturday night, during the latter part of January, 1921, and that said Wiltse, after he had been turned loose to catch bootleggers with the whiskey bait, proceeded to drink the liquor entrusted to him, getting intoxicated, and while in an intoxicated condition, Wiltse told those with whom he came in contact with, his business in Medford, and displayed his badge; that J. J. McMahon phoned to me at Ashland, Oregon, about midnight from Medford, and told me of Wiltse's actions, and that he, J. J. McMahon, had taken his star away from him, and started Wiltse out of town, telling him to get out and stay out, and that Wiltse was headed towards Ashland, and for me to keep an eye on him, and see that he did not pull off anything again, which I did, for the balance of Saturday night and Sunday; that at the time I was carrying a special deputy sheriff's star given me by C. E. Terrill, Sheriff of Jackson County, Oregon.
