SWEAR THAT D. M. LOWE IS A KU KLUX KLANER

J. E. Edmiston and Wm. Craig, Former Members of Secret Order, Make Affidavit They Sat With Candidate for Sheriff in K. K. K. Meetings.

State of Oregon, County of Jackson—ss. I, Raymond R. Reter, being first duly sworn, depose and say: That prior to the 11th day of March, 1922, I was a member of the Medford division, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan; that during the time I was a member I attended meetings of said organization in Medford; that the members of said organization are only known as Klansmen during the regular sessions of the said organization; that at all other times they are instructed to be known as citizens of the Invisible Empire; that no persons but the duly elected and initiated members, are authorized to sit at the meetings of said organization, and that they are Klansmen only during the actual time that they so sit during the lodge session. That I am well acquainted with one D. M. Lowe, recall candidate for sheriff; that I have sat in the lodge meetings of said organization in company with said D. M. Lowe on several occasions; that I could not be mistaken as to his presence because he is a militant and vociferous member and positively know that during the time that I was a member he was a citizen of the Invisible Empire and a member of the Ku Klux Klan. That if the said D. M. Lowe makes any statement to the contrary, he makes it upon the technical ground that outside of the regular meetings he is a citizen of the Invisible Empire and is only a Klansman while in attendance at a regular lodge session, and that this is the status of every other member of the organization.

MINISTERS ASSOC. OF MEDFORD TOSS HATS IN THE RING The Ministerial association of Medford has thrown its hat in the ring in the embargo over the recall of Sheriff Terrill, and at a meeting yesterday lined itself up with the Ministerial association of Ashland, which organization has had its colors nailed to the mast since the fight begun. In this city there has been feeling of dissatisfaction over the fact that the Medford organization had not heretofore come out in the open, as it is claimed that in its inactivity, the recall movement was gotten under way under a joint agreement of the ministerial associations of both cities. Yesterday, the Medford organization held a meeting and went on record by the adoption of the following resolutions:

A PUBLIC STATEMENT Inasmuch as the name of the Medford Ministerial association has been variously associated with the propaganda and news pertaining to the recall of Sheriff E. E. Terrill, we, the undersigned members of the above named association, desire to make the following statements, to-wit: Whereas, previous to the bringing in of special officers for the enforcement of the prohibition laws, "bootlegging" with the abominations and immoralities incident thereto, was freely practiced throughout Jackson county in defiance of the constitutions of the United States and of the state of Oregon, and Whereas, the sheriff was either unable or unwilling to bring the

principal offenders to justice, and Whereas, the report of the grand jury, dated February 25, 1921, incorporated the following statement in regard to the sheriff's office: "This jury \* \* \* expresses its opinion to the people of Jackson county that the sheriff is far from doing his duty, if not deliberately allowing wrong doers to escape the consequences." Therefore, be it resolved that we, the undersigned members of the Medford Ministerial association do hereby express our conviction that it will serve the best interests and moral welfare of the citizens of Jackson county to exercise the right of franchise in recalling Sheriff Terrill from office as sheriff of Jackson county.

And be it further resolved, that whereas we have the assurance that D. M. Lowe is in sympathy with, and will give his best efforts to the enforcement of the prohibition and all other laws, we do hereby reaffirm our endorsement of the said D. M. Lowe as candidate for sheriff of Jackson county. Be it further stated that this action is taken without request from any organization or representative of any organization, but because of our conviction that (petty politics, personalities and other objectionable features incident to the recall agitation, aside)—the question resolves itself in the final analysis to a moral issue centering around the enforcement of the 18th amendment of the constitution of the United States and our state prohibition laws.
