State Fair Winners Will Exhibit Here

The coming Jackson county fair on the new fair grounds in September is attracting wide attention all over the state and in northern California, and letters of inquiry from breeders of livestock and probable entries in agricultural lines are coming in daily.

The River Banks farm in Josephine county, famed as one of the leading Guernsey cattle and Berkshire hog breeders of the northwest, and which captured prizes at the state fair and Pacific Livestock Exposition in recent years, will have a large exhibit at the local fair, as witness the letter of inquiry just received from the farm by Clyde E. Miles, to County Agent Cate.

"Upon receipt of your recent letter, I went out and put an extra curl in the old boar's tail and told him to fill out, and we could step out again with the aristocracy in Josephine and Jackson counties.

"We will come with about 11 Guernseys and 23 Berkshires, and will need seven double stalls for cattle and 11 pens for the Berks. In addition to this we are going to ask your association for one free stall in each of the Guernsey and Berk sections for use as headquarters for our farm, where our men can sleep, and where we can arrange some chairs, a lounge, etc.

"I wish you would get me a letter from your association granting us this concession. It is a pretty expensive trip for the premium paid, and if we get "trimmed" we shall need all the free stuff we can get.

"Also, can we get some dairymen near there to bring us enough silage every day to feed our cattle stuff? If that can be arranged we shall not have to break them over onto beet pulp. Could you call someone up and get a price on this?"

EATS ENOUGH FOR FOUR MEN Probably Largest Human Consumer of Food in the World Threatens to Afflict Russia.

Highly interesting is the coincidence that the largest human consumer of food in the world should be a Russian, and, though at present outside that distressed country, he is announced as anxious to return to it in order to go to work on his father's farm.

The giant, Kazanloff by name, is described in the Journal of the American Medical Association as being nine feet three inches tall and weighing 485 pounds, his proportions being symmetrical. Four meals a day are needed to stoke this physical engine, hunger being his governing emotion.

PLANTS NEED COLD WEATHER

Experiments Have Shown That in Northern Countries a Certain Amount is Essential.

According to common belief, cold weather causes plants to become dormant during the fall, while warm weather the succeeding spring again incites new growth. Intensive investigations of Dr. Frederick V. Coville of the federal Department of Agriculture, which have been conducted over a period of ten years, and which have covered every phase of this subject, demonstrate that both of these traditional theories are erroneous.

Interestingly enough, the Coville experiments show that plants which have responded to the lure of autumnal and winter dormancy will not react properly and resume normal growth the following spring unless they are subjected during the interim to a period of chilling. A certain amount of cold is essential to stimulating the plant growth—Scientific American.

The belt is of fine wire gauze with waterproof letters fastened upon it. Home Owners Wasted \$626,500,000 Last Year Replacing Metal That Rust Had Destroyed



SIMPLE harmless rain-water, to which Shakespeare likened the quality of mercy, is not so merciful as a great many people think. It may make the crops grow, but it cost the United States \$626,500,000 last year just the same.

While it caused the flowers to bloom it went after the sheet metal work of the American home and rotted away leaders and gutters, valleys and flashings to the extent of over half a billion dollars.

Another unnecessary expense to home-owners is found in the incessant renewals necessary to plumbing pipe where rust-clogs reduce the flow and deterioration is very rapid. The estimated total of annual waste in renewals to iron pipe in hot-water lines alone is placed at approximately \$80,000,000.

Bran Muffin Recipe By Washington Chef

Four tablepoonsful flour, four tablepoonsful bran, one tablepoonsful lard, one tablepoonsful butter, one tablepoonsful baking powder, one tablepoonsful sugar, two eggs, one-fourth pint cold milk, a pinch of salt. Mix the above thoroughly, flour with baking powder, add lard and butter, mix and add bran, egg and milk, bake in hot oven twenty minutes.

UNDER STRIKE CONDITIONS BEST EXPLAINED BY CHAIRMAN BEN W. HOOPER OF THE UNITED STATES RAILROAD LABOR BOARD IN HIS STATEMENT OF JULY 1ST, READING AS FOLLOWS

"In this case the conflict is not between the employer and the oppressed employee. The people of this country, through an act of congress, signed by President Wilson, established a tribunal to decide such disputes over wages and working conditions, which are submitted to it in a proper manner. It is the decision of this tribunal against which the shop crafts are striking.

"Regardless of any question of the right of the men to strike, the men who take the strikers' places are merely accepting the wages and working conditions prescribed by a government tribunal and are performing a public service. They are not accepting the wages and working conditions which an employer is trying to impose. For this reason public sentiment and full government power will protect the men who remain in their positions and new men who may come in."

Adequate provisions have been made for the full protection of all new employees, the same as old employees who have remained loyally at work. Applicants should apply to the office of the superintendent at Portland (Union station), or to the assistant superintendent at Roseburg.
