MAKE 'EM LAY

The laying hens should eat about equal parts (by weight) of dry mash and scratch grain during the course of the day. However, due to the greatest digestibility and safe protein content Olympic Egg Mash can be fed in greater proportion. The mash feed makes the eggs. We recommend feeding Olympic Egg Mash so that it constitutes 60 to 65 per cent of the daily ration of feed. Feed only enough grain to keep the hens active and supply proper body maintenance. The skilled feeder is always on the lookout to see how his hens are eating. He cannot always rely apon feeding the scratch by weight or measure as the fowls' appetites vary with the weather, time of year and egg production. Ordinarily from 8 to 12 pounds of scratch a day will be given to a hundred hens. This should be divided into two feedings, giving about one-third in the morning and two-thirds at the afternoon feeding. Feed all scratch in a deep, dry straw litter. Feed the layers and arrange the laying house so as to furnish them the most exercise. The active hen is the healthy and most productive
