CONTRACT WILL GIVE WATER TO 10,000 ACRES

SHASTA VIEW, Or., Aug. 2.—The long delayed irrigation of 10,000 acres of land that is going to play a large part in the development of Klamath county has been settled beyond doubt by the signing of a contract between the government and the Shasta View and Malin irrigation districts, which was signed without a dissenting voice. The irrigation of these lands has been worked for unceasingly for a number of years and through the untiring efforts of those interested, the reward has at last come. It was unanimously voted to bond the districts, Malin for \$100,000, and Shasta View for \$120,000 for the purpose of putting in pumping plants, building ditches, etc. The government is to put the water to the plants.

How badly we need this sophistication every American home can determine for itself by a safe and simple experiment. Mr. Lewis brought back with him London's latest wheeze. After the dishes are cleared away the head of the family can try it on his flock. It runs like this:

One chap says to another: "Oh, I say, isn't that girl at that table the same one we saw last night?"

"I can't say. The tablecloth is too long."
If the flock gets the point it is adequately sophisticated. If the point escapes them and leaves them puzzled and puzzled it is a sign that this family, at least, would be benefited by a Menckian pontificate, for Henry spreads not only a "message of sophistication," but other things as well.—Norfolk Virginian-Pilot.

MAY BE "LAST OF EMPIRES"
