Where Women Count

A campaign is on foot, promoted by the liquor traffic, for a subscription list of a million men at one dollar a head, for the purpose of smashing the eighteenth amendment. The subscription list is to be called the "Association Against the Prohibition Amendment." Their declared purpose is "to get the Volstead act out of law and to keep it out," to leave the enforcement of the amendment to the several states, and to work persistently for the repeal of the amendment. They expect to use their funds chiefly in newspaper advertising to show the people "the hideous failure and the enormous cost in money and lives in prohibition as now enforced."

The Women's Christian Temperance Union, through whose work, more than through any other force, public opinion was molded for the prohibition amendment, has met this challenge of the liquor forces by a call for a half million new members to the Union, in addition to the half million now in its membership. These members are not only pledged to keep the Volstead act in the law, but are pledged to total abstinence, and to work for the destruction of everything for which the old saloon ever stood.

CHOPPED GREEN OLIVES AND EGGS ON TOAST



The eggs and green olives blend perfectly in this toast sandwich extraordinary. Sufficient for six helpings can be prepared in 25 minutes. Try this tasty and unusual combination when "something new" is desired. One cup chopped Spanish green olives; 4 eggs well beaten; 1/3 cup milk; 1/2 teaspoon minced onion; 3 tablespoons butter. Toast for 6 sandwiches. Cut bread 1/4 inch thick and toast lightly on both sides. Spread sparingly with butter. Mix eggs with milk. Melt butter in hot frying pan, add onion and simmer for a few minutes. Four in egg mixture and cook slowly until eggs begin to thicken. Stir in olives and continue stirring until the mixture is creamy and very hot. Spread between two slices toast and serve at once. Garnish with parsley or watercress.

GREEN OLIVE CLUB DRESSING. Serves 5, Preparation 10 Min. 1/2 c. mayonnaise, 2 tsp. Chili sauce, 1/2 c. chopped stoned Spanish green olives, 1 tsp. horseradish. METHOD: Mix, chill and serve on lettuce, chopped cabbage, cold spinach, or with sea food.

MILK TEST FOR MONTH SHOWS COWS ON VACATION

One hundred and ninety cows were tested in Jackson county in July, of which 33 are found in the 40 pound list. This is the season of bovine vacations, accounting for the low average and the smaller number of animals on test. The average per cow is 552 pounds of milk and 26.35 of fat. E. B. Poyer again heads the list with an average of 50.14 of fat and 1031 of milk. An average of 855 of milk and 39.37 of fat was made by the 16 Jerseys owned by R. E. Robison of Talent. OPPOSED CREAM IN COFFEE

Frenchman, a Century Ago, Ascribed All Sorts of Human Ills to the Custom.

Arsene Thiebaud de Berneud, Il-brarian a century ago to the Biblio-theque Mazarin, Paris, opposed with ferocity the then comparatively new custom of adding milk or cream to black coffee. The latter, in the author's language, was "consoling, joyful and, I had nearly said, spiritual" in its effects. But let ever so small a quantity of milk or cream be added and the result upon the human economy was most disastrous.

According to Le Progres Medical, which obtained the above information from a new popular review, La Connaissance, de Berneud claimed that many eminent physicians shared his opinions. He seems to have had an obsession that all mixtures of fluids were injurious, and extended his prescription of milk addition to tea, chocolate and spirits. Sustained by this pre-conceived notion, he was able to publish a long diatribe in 1826, in which he accuses cafe au lait of causing almost every derangement known to medicine. But, rabid as he sounds, he was fatuous enough to admit that perhaps 10 per cent of the people might be tough enough to drink cafe au lait without disastrous results.—New York World.

BUILDING UP BUFFALO HERDS

Department of Agriculture Has Had Gratifying Success With This Part of Its Work.

Forty-six new buffalo calves are reported on three of the four game preserves maintained by the biological survey of the United States Department of Agriculture for the special protection of buffalo. On the national buffalo range, in Montana, there are 417 buffalo, including 28 calves born this spring. Fifteen calves are reported at the Wind Cave preserve, in South Dakota, and 3 at Niobrara, Neb.

The department has been very fortunate in maintaining the herds established at these three points and at Sully's Hill, North Dakota. There are relatively few large buffalo herds now scattered over the country, and the biological survey has made special efforts to provide suitable ranges and protection for what threatened a few years ago to become an extinct species of native American animal.

DEMAND FOR CASCARA BARK

Industry Was Once a Baby, but It Has Developed Greatly in Washington State.

A half million dollars was the value of this season's cascara bark, harvested by Grays Harbor (Wash.) folk. It is the peeled leather-like skin of the barberry tree, stripped by settlers and city dwellers who spend six weeks each spring in the swampy forests near Hoquiam.

Six years ago this bark gathering industry was a babe, the few who attempted to sell the peeled bark getting from 3 to 4 cents per pound for it—not knowing just how to properly cure and pack it.

Then came the drug famine. The wholesale price which has gradually been rising is now 15 cents per pound and skillful strippers make \$10 to \$15 per day. With a knife an incision is made near the ground and a piece of bark once loosened there may be pulled from the tree upward for ten to fifteen feet. Tying but a part of the bark does not injure the tree.
