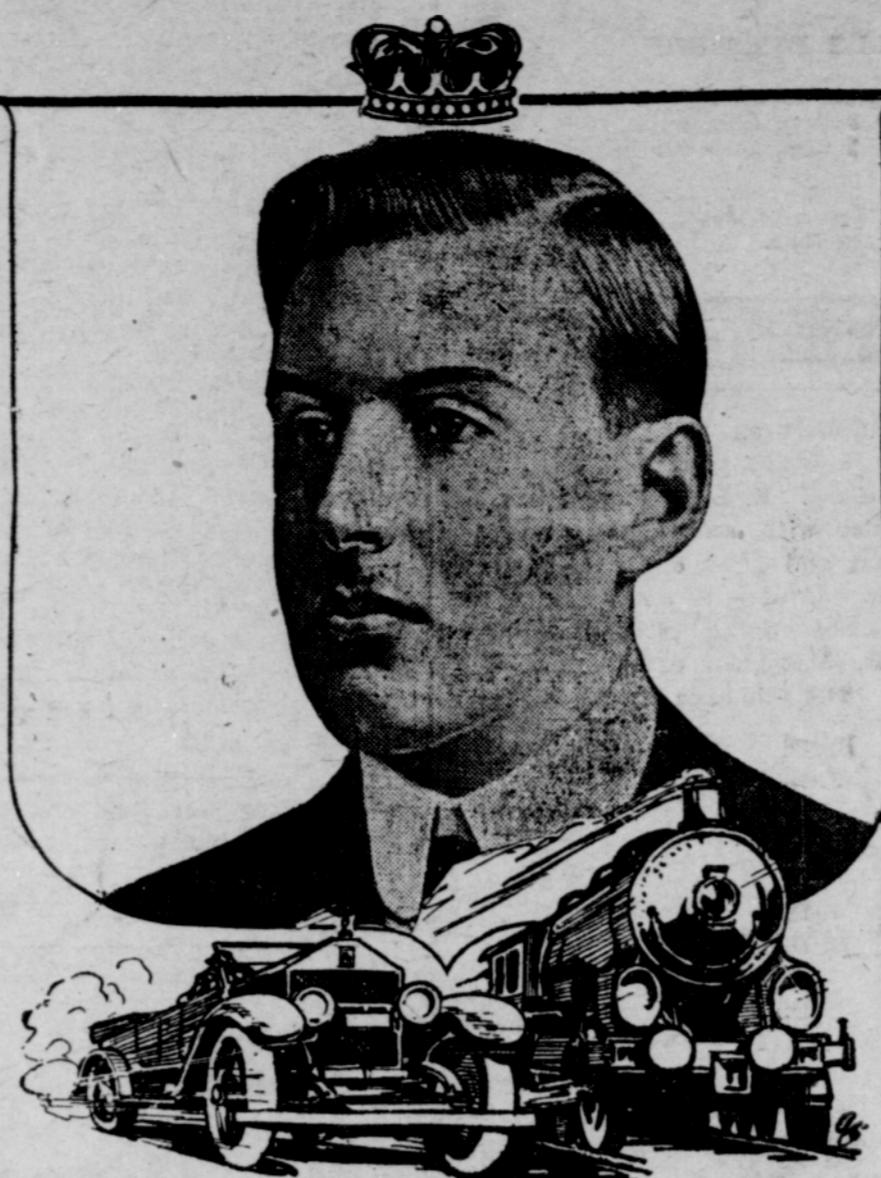

Duke in Automobile Beats Fast Train from London to Aberdeen



COVERING THE 610 miles that separate London and Aberdeen in 12 hours with his Rolls-Royce car, the young Duke of Leinster has won a wager of \$15,000 from another sporting member of the nobility. Leinster was allowed 15 hours by the terms of the wager to complete the dash from the English capital over Old North Road to the Scottish city. The race settled an argument over the relative speed possibilities of automobile and railroad. In winning the \$15,000 Leinster was forced to beat the fastest express train between London and Aberdeen.

COUNCIL ORDERS NEW SIDEWALKS AND WATER MAINS

The city of Ashland is again starting a constructive program, after several months of inactivity along this line, the city council at its meeting Tuesday night having ordered cement sidewalks built on both sides of Pioneer avenue from Main street to Hargadine street, on both sides of First street from Main to Hargadine, and on the north side of Hargadine street from First to Second street.

The first two named streets are on the side'll and have needed something of this kind for some time as the rains in the spring wash the gravel walks until they are dangerous to pass over.

Authority was also granted by the council at its meeting for the purchase of 2500 feet of water main, the principal part of which will be used in replacing the mains on A street, which are in a very bad shape. The replacement of this main will entail considerable expense, as the pavement will have to be cut the entire distance and replaced following the laying of the mains.

Water Superintendent Hosler reports that the soil in the lower part of the city contains acids that eat the ordinary pipe, and asked permission to get mains that were especially built to withstand this acid, and thereby save the replacement of them so frequently.

GOLD MONEY IS AGAIN APPEARING IN THE WEST
