

COUNCIL ORDERS **NEW SIDEWALKS** AND WATER MAINS

The city of Ashland is again starting a constructive program, after several months of inactivity along this line, the city council at its meeting Tuesday night having ordered cement sidewalks built on both sides of Pioneer avenue from Main street to Hargadine street, on both sides of First street from Main to Hargadine, and on the north side of Hargadine street from First to Second street.

The first two named streets are on the sidehill and have needed something of this kind for some time as the rains in the spring wash the gravel walks until they are dangerous to pass over.

Authority was also granted by the council at its meeting for the purchase of 2500 feet of water main, the principal part of which will be used in replacing the mains on A street, which are in a very bad shape. The replacement of this main will entail considerable expense, as the pavement will have to be cut the entire distance and re-
