UASIS IN ARIZONA DESERT

What Has Been Done to Make Ajo, for Centuries an Arid Spot, "Blossom Like the Rose."

West of the Santa Cruz and south of the Gila in Arizona the territory is generally an irreclaimable desert. Its mountains, however, abound in rich ore of gold, silver and copper. At the celebrated mine, the New Cornelia Copper company has created in the midst of this arid district a garden spot with atractive and artistic houses of mission architecture, and broad avenues lined with palms. This has been accomplished by providing a million gallons of water a day, which is pumped from a 700-foot well eight miles from town.
