Beetle Campaign Is Successful in Klamath Basin

KLAMATH FALLS, Aug. 5.—Loss of timber in the Klamath basin this season through pine beetle depredations was reduced at least 50 per cent, it is estimated in the report of the board of control, issued today.

"It is yet too early to make any definite statement as to the results obtained, as these can be only arrived at through the survey which will be conducted over the project late in the spring of 1923," the report says.

The above estimate, however, means that the loss of \$72,000 worth of timber (assuming a value of \$3 per thousand) which occurred in 1920 on the areas worked this spring will be reduced at least \$36,000 annually for the next three years, or a net saving of \$78,000 over the cost of this spring's work.

One hundred and eighty men were employed on the project with an average weekly payroll of \$3750. As specialized labor was required, men were instructed in training camps until 30 spotters and compassmen were developed.

DUBLIN, Aug. 5.—Eamonn De Valera is preparing to flee into the Irish mountains to assume the life of a guerilla chieftain, according to reports from the "front."

De Valera is said to be seen daily on the border of Limerick and Tipperary counties, with a rifle slung over his shoulder, leading his forces, which it is said are mainly made up of young school boys.

The irregular stronghold at Kilmallock is being surrounded, and its capture is expected hourly.
