UPLAND, Calif., Aug. 8.—A red racer snake nearly choked Sullivan Marshall, a negro cement worker to death, according to a story told by William Cline, a cement contractor and employer of Marshall.

The negro and other workers were camping near their work in Mentone district, Thursday night, after they had gone to their tents to sleep, choking sounds were heard from Marshall's bed. The other men investigated and found the snake wrapped around the negro's neck. It took two men to remove it.

HER ENUNCIATION IN DANGER

Woman Was Beginning to Feel the Strain of Prolonged Conversation With "Foreigners"

The woman was visiting the family on the event of the engagement of the youngest daughter. The family was Bostonian by birth and tradition, but the two eldest girls had married several years before and had left their native city. One of them married a Southerner and the other a Westerner. Each had acquired the accent of her particular locality and the children of the Southern couple had a perfect Southern drawl, while the other sister's children had the broad Western accent.

The effect was startling and the woman could scarcely follow the conversation. It almost seemed that these sisters were from strange countries, each speaking her own tongue. The mother of the three girls was most confused. When she addressed her Southern daughter she unconsciously affected the Southern drawl and when she talked to her Western son-in-law she nearly perfected the Western accent.

In the hall later, as they were leaving, the mother clutched the woman's arm. "My dear," she breathed, "I'm ruining my enunciation trying to talk to these foreigners."—Chicago Journal.

Question Authority Of Railroad Cop

C. W. Priest, railroad policeman for the Southern Pacific company, was promised trouble yesterday, when he arrested a man named Young for trespassing on railroad property. The man, upon being told he could take his choice of buying a ticket out of the city or going before the justice of the peace, preferred the former. Having bought the ticket, he, together with some associates, got into communication with District Attorney Rawles Moore and asked him to come over and take action.

Mr. Moore arrived in the city late in the afternoon in company with Attorney Farrell, who had been retained by sympathizers of the man arrested, and called the various parties together in an effort to get things settled without further trouble. The district attorney, after having heard both sides, and as no one would swear to a complaint against Officer Priest, decided he could take no action in the matter.

Priest is still on the job and brought two men before Justice of the Peace Gowdy today on the charge of trespassing on the railroad property. One was given a fine of \$2.50, while the other was released upon proof that he was dead broke. The court ordered that both be taken to the city limits by the police, which order was carried out.

MARS MAY BE INHABITED, BUT SCIENCE DOUBTS IT

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—Science does not know whether there is life on the planet Mars, and the evidence is strongly against such a belief, says Dr. Harlow Shapley, the famous astronomer, writing in the August Mentor magazine.

In 1877 Schiaparelli, an Italian astronomer, discovered lines on the surface of Mars and called them "canali." The word, unfortunately translated "canal," suggested artificial construction, whereas there is nothing to indicate Schiaparelli intended such an implication, Dr. Shapley says.

Too Bad! Too Bad!

This is the story told by a New Orleans gentleman attending the foreign trade convention: A steamship arriving from a French port had an enterprising officer who saw a fine opportunity to profit through the dry condition of the United States. He put in a large stock of liquor, and when the vessel arrived in New Orleans had no trouble in getting in touch with purchasers. They agreed to pay on delivery.

The price was \$3,000. The liquor was passed over the ship's side in the middle of the night on to a small vessel alongside and the \$3,000 given to the officer. The next day the seller went to the bank to buy French exchanges. A few minutes later he was doing two things at one time—tearing his hair and swearing like a trooper. His \$3,000 was Confederate money.—Philadelphia Public Ledger.

OLYMPIC Very little wet mash feeding is practiced nowadays. However, old hens and retarded pullets can often be boosted along by an additional moist mash once a day. Mix Olympic Egg Mash just crumbly with water and feed in troughs about noon or an hour after the evening feed of scratch. If artificial lights are used. Quite a few poultrymen practice this late additional moist mash feeding with all their layers in conjunction with artificial lights. Feed only what will be cleaned up in 20 to 30 minutes. Carefully avoid any sudden change in the method of feeding. Make all changes gradually, otherwise you may throw the fowls off on egg production and possibly cause a molt.
