S. P. FINDS USE FOR ITS "SCRAPPED" BOILERS

The locomotive that once was the pride of a division and hauled a "limited" train, but has had to give way to later and improved type motive power, still has an opportunity for useful if humble service.

The Southern Pacific company's store department, which has charge of reclamation work, and which accomplished even such small savings as the making of washers from boiler tubes and tin drinking cups from coffee cans, has found a use for old locomotive and stationary engine boilers. By the use of oxy-acetylene welding and cutting torch, the firebox is cut off, the flues removed, new heads welded on the boiler shell, and the container, thus formed used as an underground storage tank for oil.

UNITED STATES HAS 40 PER CENT OF WORLD'S GOLD

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—Gold held by the central banks of all the principal world powers now amounts to \$7,851,000,000—a new record. This sum is an increase of \$1,238,000,000 in two years. The increase is due to the fact that governments by restrictive gold policies have brought gold out of hiding. Then there has been a steady flow of new gold from the mines.

Of the world's total, the United States has 40 per cent or \$3,170,000,000. Most of this gold is in the possession of the 12 federal reserve banks of the federal reserve system, or in the vaults of the United States treasury and its branch depositories.

PUBLIC AGAIN TO VIEW INDEPENDENCE DECLARATION

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—The Declaration of Independence, hidden from the public for years, is again to be put on exhibition at Washington, says the August Mentor Magazine. The famous document is still fairly legible. This is not the draft that was presented to congress; that disappeared long since. It is not even known whether or not the members of congress signed the first draft. The existing document was engrossed on parchment and received most of its signatures on August 2, 1776. It was transferred from the patent office to the library of congress in 1921.

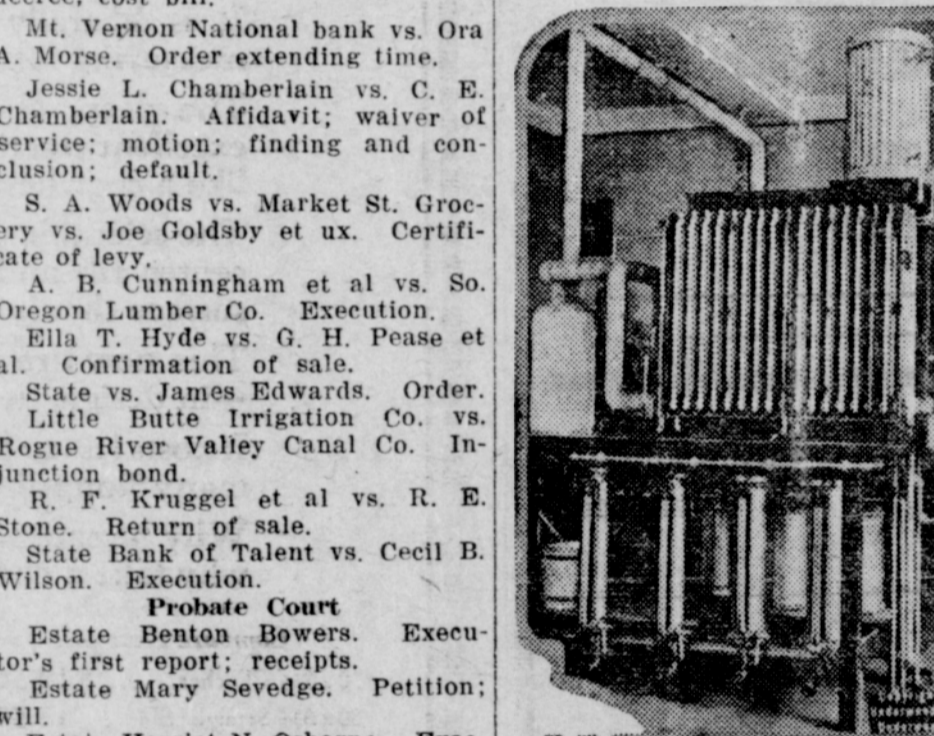
