## VICE-PRESIDENT UNITED STATES IN ASHLAND TOMORROW

### A Great Crowd is Expected to Give Him Welcome When Shasta Limited Arrives at 8 A.M. Saturday

#### WILL ARRIVE IN SPECIAL CAR ATTACHED TO SHASTA LIMITED

It is expected the Vice-President will make a brief speech and be taken for drive through Lithia Park.

Vice-President Calvin Coolidge and party will arrive in Ashland on train 12 at 8 o'clock tomorrow morning, and plans are being made to take them for a trip about the city and through Lithia park, if they care to leave the train at all.

The following wire was sent this morning by Mayor Lamkin and W. H. McNair, president of the chamber of commerce:

"Ashland, Oregon, Aug. 11, 1922. "Honorable Calvin Coolidge, vice-president of the United States of America.

"Dear Vice-President: As your train stops in our city 20 minutes tomorrow, we would be pleased to take yourself and family, private secretary, and all the friends of your party, through our city and park. It is one of the most beautiful cities that you will see on your whole trip. We would be very much pleased to have you give us an address of what ever time you might have to spare us. Please wire answer.

"Sincerely, "C. B. Lamkin, mayor of Ashland. "W. H. McNair, president of the chamber of commerce."

It is seldom the privilege of the people of the west to see so noted a personage as a vice-president of the United States, and every citizen of Ashland should turn out and make the best of this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity of greeting Vice-President Coolidge.

United States Robert N. Stanfield has written personally to Bert R. Greer and H. K. ### CITY OF CORK DEVASTATED BY FLEEING REBELS

LONDON, Aug. 11.—The city of Cork has been completely devastated by the Irish rebels.

### ARMED GUARDS PATROL RAILROAD YARDS AT WEED

WEED, Calif., Aug. 11.—For some days past the Southern Pacific has been maintaining guards armed with rifles and shot guns in its yards at Weed.

A few days ago two strikers, Miles Leathers and E. Hall, it is charged stopped a young man named Taylor in Weed and asked him where he was working. Taylor advised them he was working in the Southern Pacific roundhouse. After an exchange of arguments, Taylor drew a revolver. Later, Leathers swore to a warrant for his arrest. The case against Taylor was dismissed in the justice court.

### FIEND IS SOUGHT WHO STRIPPED AND ASSAULTED WOMAN

PORTLAND, Aug. 11.—Portland's entire police department is searching the city for the fiend who brutally attacked a 25-year-old woman at 11:45 o'clock Wednesday night in Columbia park.

The description of the brute tallies exactly with that given within the last month by two other women who were attacked in a similar manner in the same general section of the city.

The report which the detective bureau was given today by Captain L. A. Harms stated that the woman was attacked while walking past the park, dragged into the brush and tied to a tree with her stockings, after which she was stripped of every piece of clothing. After stuffing a soiled handkerchief into her mouth as a gag, the fiend is said to have heaped indescribable insults on the helpless woman, after which he informed her he was going after a gun. He returned in a few minutes after having apparently changed his clothing, cut the stocking which bound the woman to the tree and fled into the darkness. He also robbed her pocketbook of \$6.

### RAIL HEADS AND WORKERS HAVE NEW PROPOSAL

#### PRESIDENT AGAIN TRIES RECONCILIATION ON BOTH SIDES

#### Railway Executives Consider Second Proposals in New York, and Union Heads Discuss Them in Washington Conference.

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—President Harding's second set of proposals for settling the national strike of railway shopmen, was formally presented to the railway executives at their meeting here today. They discussed them at length during the morning session, but no decision was reached. It was understood that sentiment is evenly divided upon accepting the president's proposals with modifications, and "standing pat."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—The heads of 16 of the standard railroad unions spent three hours in their first session here today, discussing "matters of policy" in the shopmen's strike.

When the session recessed, Warren Stone, chief of the Brotherhood of Engineers, said that no conclusion had been definitely reached, and probably would not be until tomorrow.

#### SHOPMEN STRIKE EXPECTED ON CANADIAN RAILROADS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—That a strike of railroad shopmen in Canada is imminent, is the statement of Vice-President McClelland of the Association of Machinists, who is representing Canadian rail workers in the meeting of union officials here.

### COUNTY FAIR WILL FURNISH MANY THRILLS

A meeting of the directors of the Jackson County Fair association was held Wednesday night at the chamber of commerce rooms in Medford. Those in attendance from Ashland were T. H. Simpson and Fred Herlin.

Mr. Simpson states that application for space exceeds the amount available, and that applicants who show up at the last minute may be left out entirely. While the building program is ahead of schedule, there will not be nearly enough roof to cover the various exhibits, and it will be necessary to resort to many tents.

PARIS, Aug. 11.—Miss Mathilde McCormick, the wealthy young American girl, whose engagement to Max Oser, former Swiss cavalry officer, has attracted wide attention, left Paris for Switzerland today, presumably to join her fiance.

### BOOZE RUNNERS LOSE \$75,000 IN GOOD LIQUOR

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 11.—Liquor worth \$75,000 was seized, and six men in two trucks and an automobile, were arrested while attempting to land the contraband at a wharf here.

A dozen members of the landing party, with one truckload and two automobiles, laden with liquor estimated at \$50,000 worth, got away clean.

#### FILM STAR IN AUTO CRASH; MAY COST HIS LIFE

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Aug. 11.—Eugene O'Brien, well known motion picture actor, is in a critical condition at a Hollywood hospital today, with grave internal injuries and a possible fracture of the skull, as a result of being run down by a motor truck last night, while walking on a highway in the Hollywood hills. The Japanese driver of the truck, who said he did not see O'Brien walking, hurried the actor to the hospital.

### CHOLERA HORROR LEFT IN WAKE OF BIG TYPHOON

#### CAUSED BY THE POLLUTION OF WATERS BY THE BODIES OF UNBURIED DEAD

#### Number of Victims of Chinese Disaster at Swatow Is Now Estimated At 50,000—Call for Help in Fighting Plague Is Sent Forth.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 11.—Cholera is adding to the horror left in the wake of the typhoon which destroyed the city of Swatow with the loss of 50,000 lives.

United States Consul General Cunningham received an appeal from the United States consul at Swatow for supplies to fight the cholera epidemic, which, he said, is now sweeping the city as a result of the pollution of the water by the dead bodies of animals and human beings.

#### "BIG TIM" MURPHY FREED IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 11.—"Big Tim" Murphy, charged with murder in connection with the death of a policeman supposedly killed by labor bombers, was freed today when the state, at the recommendation of Judge Taylor, nolle prossed the case.

#### 10,000 ATTEND FIRST DAY OF MULTNOMAH CO. FAIR

GRESHAM, Or., Aug. 11.—Yesterday set a brand new record for the Multnomah county fair. Never in its history has there been such an enormous crowd in attendance the first day of the race meet. It is estimated close to 10,000 people passed through the turnstile.

### JOINT PICNIC IN LITHIA PARK ON LABOR DAY

Arrangements for a joint picnic of the Modern Woodmen of America and the Woodmen of the World, to be held in Lithia park on Labor day, were completed at a meeting held Wednesday night.

The two organizations have agreed to go 50-50 on the expenses of the picnic, and they will furnish coffee and trimmings, while the picnicers are expected to bring well-filled baskets. The picnic is not limited to the members and families of the two fraternal orders, but a general invitation is extended to the public to come out and enjoy the day as their guests.

The Bungalow has been rented, and music will be furnished for dancing during the afternoon and evening.

Races and contests of various kinds are scheduled for the afternoon, and some handsome prizes are to be hung up for the winners.

The membership of the two orders amounts to about 2000 in the valley, and it is expected that between 2500 and 3000 persons will take part in the festivities of the day.

#### EXPLOSION ON OCEAN LINER KILLS FIREMAN

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—Two fire-room employees were killed in a terrific explosion aboard the White Star liner Adriatic, 300 miles east of Portland, Maine, today, according to a wireless message received here. Another member of the crew is missing.

Following the explosion, which rocked the big liner, flames shot skyward as high as the mastsheads, said a dispatch.

All the passengers are safe, and the Adriatic is reported to be proceeding under her own steam.

### AUTO HIT ON TRACK; EUGENE MAN KILLED

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 11.—An attempt to drive his car over a railroad crossing in front of a Southern Pacific train, ended fatally for Theme Bailey, 60, Eugene gardener, here yesterday. Bailey, who apparently did not see the train, was hit by the engine of passenger train No. 14, northbound, at the end of 13th avenue East. His car was carried two blocks. Bailey is survived by a widow and a son, the latter a student at the University of Oregon.

### TUG TURNS TURTLE AND TWO OF CREW ARE DROWNED

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—Four of the seven members of the crew of the tugboat "Clarence Howland," are believed to have been drowned when the vessel overturned at Port Richmond shipyard docks today.

A towline caught under the bow of the little vessel as it was getting under way, overturning it, and the boat sank almost instantly.

### FRANCE-ENGLAND MAY YET AGREE TO HELP GERMANY

LONDON, Aug. 11.—Hope that Great Britain and France would reconcile their differences and reach an agreement upon the German indemnity was greatly strengthened today.

The air has cleared, and there were indications that progress was being made towards a compromise by which Germany would get a moratorium. Both British and French were said to be making concessions.

Lloyd George is using all of his famous persuasive powers to secure French support for the British proposals, providing for a reduced indemnity, a reparations moratorium, and stricter supervision of German finances.

### LAWYERS WOULD BAN TOTTING OF GUNS IN U.S.A.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 11.—Absolute prohibition of the manufacture and sale of pistols and ammunition, save as necessary for governmental and official use, was recommended by the law enforcement committee in its report to the American Bar association, following an investigation of the causes of the increase in crime.

The committee found that pistols figured in 90 per cent of the 9500 homicides in this country last year. Crime is rampant, the committee reported, with the United States the most lawless of the civilized nations of the world.

The report showed that since 1910 there has been a "steady and terrible increase" in homicides, burglaries and robberies throughout the country. Criminals number a little less than one-third of one per cent of the population, the report declared.

#### FRISKY TEAM BOLTS AND FAEMER IS KILLED

OREGON CITY, Aug. 11.—Driving a team of frisky horses, against one of which he had been warned repeatedly, Theodore E. Kraeft, 53, a farmer, was fatally injured yesterday morning when the team bolted. He was thrown from the wagon, and his skull was fractured. He died at the Oregon City hospital.

### CHAS. L. LOOMIS CALLED UPON TO RUN FOR MAYOR

#### ACCEPTS CANDIDACY THRUST UPON HIM AT WINBURN'S LUNCHEON

#### About Fifty Guests Were Present, and Mr. Loomis Consented to Become Candidate After Dr. Burdick Had Declined the Honor.

About fifty prominent and influential business men and ladies were the guests of Jesse Winburn at noon lunch at the Ashland hotel today. Mr. Bert Moses acted as toastmaster, and suggested the object of the gathering to be to urge Dr. R. L. Burdick to accept the candidacy for mayor of Ashland. He said that Dr. Burdick had been suggested by a number of business men as a suitable candidate, and that he felt inclined to decline the honor on account of the drain the mayorality would be on his time and resources. Mr. Moses presented Dr. Burdick as a candidate in well chosen words, but the doctor said that after fully considering the matter he had definitely decided not to allow his name to be used in connection with a candidacy.

Mr. Winburn was then called to the floor and said that he had been favorable to the candidacy of Mr. Fred Homes for mayor, but that he had learned later that he was ineligible on account of living outside the city limits, after which he turned his interest on O. H. Johnson, whom he found was already a candidate for the legislature, and therefore ineligible.

At this juncture, Mr. Greer was called for and suggested the name of Charles L. Loomis. His suggestion was received with loud and unanimous acclaim, and Mr. Loomis, who was happily present, after considerable deference, was finally urged to stand as the candidate. A petition was at once circulated and was signed by all the business men and women present.

The selection of Charles Loomis is an especially happy one. He is a man of high business qualifications, is a forward thinker and actor, and will prove a winner, both as a candidate and as mayor of Ashland for the next two years.

#### SISKIYOU REGISTRATION SHOWS BIG INCREASE

A total of 7901 voters registered for the primary election this year in Siskiyou county. This marks an increase over the registration of 1920 of approximately 500.

There are 4653 republicans, 2488 democrats, 159 socialists, 22 prohibitionists, and there were 579 voters who declined to state their politics.

### THREE GUNMEN KILLED IN TRAP SET BY POLICE

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 10.—Three men are dead, one was arrested and one is sought here today, as a result of a trap set by deputy sheriffs, which turned an attempted robbery into a gunfight. The dead are Louis Reese, Edwin Burton of Chicago criminal record, and Kenneth Pleonor of Texas. Reese and Pleonor died in the fight. Burton died later in the hospital. The fifth member of the gang is still at large.
