Having served as a member of the council for the past two years, I believe that I am qualified to assist in carrying on the business of the city in a just and economical manner.

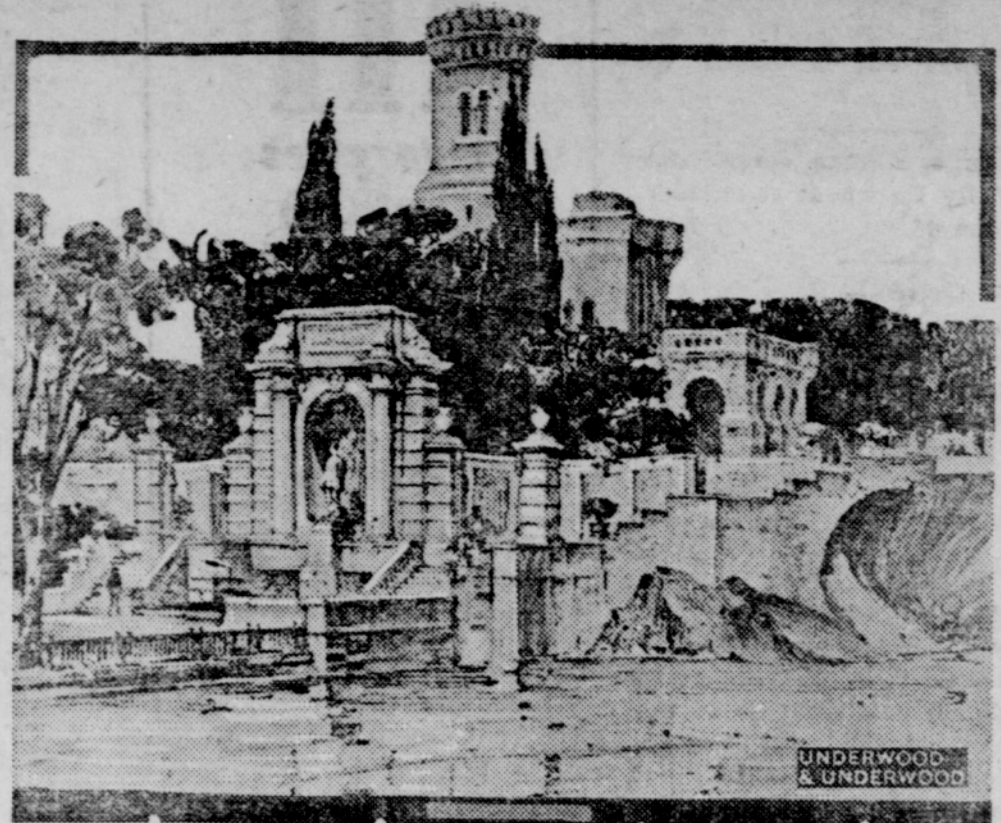

The chairman of the executive committee for the John Purroy Mitchell memorial, Robert Adamson, has given out through the architect, Donn Barber, this preliminary study of the tentative design for the monument to the late mayor of New York city. The plan for the entire memorial contemplates the lowering of the southern embankment of the old Croton reservoir in Central park and constructing thereon, near the level of the water, a tree-bordered mall or promenade which will extend from the eastern drive over to and including Vista Rock, on which stands the Belvedere.

AUTO RACER KILLED MACHINE GOES THROUGH FENCE

WESTWOOD, Calif., Aug. 16.—One man was killed and another dangerously injured when a racing automobile was wrecked in a speed test here early yesterday morning.

The dead man was Ralph Davis, manager of the Red River Lumber company's Westwood garage, and the injured one is Vern Kauffman, owner of the car.

The two men took Kauffman's car to the race track at the ball grounds at an early hour for a speed trial, and while traveling at a high rate of speed, lost control of it and crashed through the fence, rolling over several times.

Davis is survived by a wife and two small children.

LITTLE TALKS ON THRIFT

"EVEN five cents should not be wilfully wasted. Remember, it is the interest on one dollar for almost an entire year."



This statement was made by one of the wealthiest and most successful financiers in the world when he witnessed his secretary paying out five cents where it represented an absolute waste to him. Perhaps if we were to analyze the great success of this man we would find that his keen appreciation and consistent application of the principle involved in his kindly rebuke to his subordinate associate was the real secret of his rise to wealth and power. His statement was not prompted by any narrow motives suggestive of the miser. The point he had in mind was that the deliberate waste of even a very small amount is reprehensible, and has ultimate effects far in excess of the amount immediately involved.

Thrift, in its broadest aspects, is efficiency; and there can be no efficiency where there is deliberate waste.

The story is told of a boy who begged his father for a certain toy costing \$200, to which the father replied: "Son, which would you rather have, this plaything or one dollar a month for life?" And the boy wisely chose the latter. What the father had in mind was that the \$200 could be invested to yield \$12 a year plus a lesson in thrift worth many, many times that amount.

When we are tempted to waste even the smallest amounts, let us remember these points and profit by them.
