THE PRESIDENT DELIVERS STRIKE MESSAGE TO

CENSURES BOTH UNIONS AND R. R. MANAGEMENT FOR CREATING CHAOS

* Recommends Coal Commission and Asks Congress for Power to Keep Transportation Moving and Prevent Recurrence of Present Strife.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18 .- Under the shadow of the great impending industrial crisis, President Harding today told congress "the full story" of the twin coal and rail strikes, asking that legislative steps be taken to deal with the present situation and safeguard against repetition.

The president recommended that congress grant the government authority to create a coal commission to investigate that industry, and the formation of a temporary national coal agency to purchase, sell and distribute all coal carried in interstate commerce.

He severely criticized the carriers and the unions. He described the labor board as inadequate to handle the situation. He condemned strongly all acts of violence, all the way from the Herrin massacre to the desertion of trains in the Arizona des-

He said he was resolved to use maintain transportation and to sustain the right of all men to work.

This was interpreted as constituting the unequivocal assertion that if the unions quit work, the government would afford protection to the management's efforts to move the trains.



Winds from Lake Superior Driving Blaze to North Shore, and Thousands of Summer Camps Are in Danger of Destruction.

SUPERIOR, Wis., Aug. 18. -Northwestern Wisconsin and northeastern Minnesota are in serious Five hundred persons are reported as trapped by the flames at Summond, 60 miles southwest of here. Thousands of refugees are arriving here hourly by trains, automobiles and wagons.

Wireless reports from vessels on Lake Superior indicated that the flames are spreading to the northern shores of the lake and threatening the Vermillion range. Thousands of summer camps are endangered. Cotton, Central Lake and Whiteface, small Wisconsin towns, are reported as having been wiped out.
