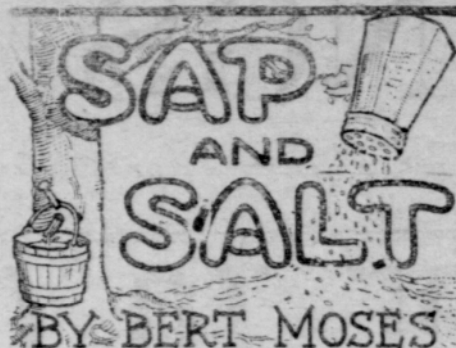

primary election. Still, in utter disregard of Hearst's wishes some of his powerful friends have been setting things up in his interest and forced him into prominence—a position repugnant to a man of Hearst's proverbial modesty.

His political chief of staff is the Honorable William J. (Fingy) Connors, the multi-millionaire war horse of Buffalo. He is now in a dog-eat-dog fight with W. H. Fitzpatrick, who has control of the regular democratic organization in Erie county. Connors is out to capture the 39 Erie delegates for Hearst, of course contrary to the publisher's desire.

But Charles F. Murphy, the Tammany boss, who was importuned and threatened in behalf of Hearst, forced him and Connors out into the open by sending this message to both of them: "You haven't any Erie county delegates. Get your own county delegates before you ask Tammany Hall to listen to you."

Opposed to Hearst for the nomination is former Governor Alfred E. Smith. The Hearst men have offered him the nomination for United States senator. Smith is faced with the alternative of being the tail to the Hearst kite or taking a chance on incurring Hearst hostility. Indications are that he will fight Hearst every foot of the road. In the event of Smith's winning, it is understood that Hearst will nominate himself for governor on an independent ticket.

Whether one views the candidacy of Hearst seriously, or as a joke, or as a piece of concentrated effrontery, the fight for the nomination interests the whole country. He might win the nomination and the election. You never can tell what the democrats of New York will do, but Hearst as a nominee for the presidency of the United States is unthinkable.

**Political Unrest Keenly Felt By Congressmen**

 WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Congress has returned to Washington uneasy, nervous and downright politically scared.

Congress usually is a bit gun-shy in these off-year campaigns when one-third of the senate and the entire membership of the house come up for re-election without the guiding voice of a national candidate to beat the party drum, clarify the issues, and set the pace. But the old-timers around the capitol say the uneasiness has been accentuated this turbulent year to a point seldom seen before.

Back here in the sweltering heat of a torrid Washington summer the members are perspiring and comparing notes as to how they found the temper of the plain people back home. The general opinion, almost the universal opinion, is that the temper of these same plain people is not such as to be conducive to complacency on the part of any members of the Sixty-seventh congress who are ambitious to be members of the Sixty-eighth.

From coast to coast in the cities, on the farms and in the small towns, returning congressmen report a spirit of political unrest is prevalent—the same unrest that so strikingly manifested itself in the primaries of

Pennsylvania, Indiana, Iowa, Nebraska and North Dakota. The representative from New England tells the same story that the congressman from the desert country tells. The unrest, they say, is confined to no section and to no group. Neither is it restricted as to parties, both democrats and republicans coming in for it.

One of the political sages of the capitol, a veteran of some twenty-odd years of political upsetting, made this prediction a few days ago to a group of his cronies:

"This year is going to be known hereafter as the year of the Big Wind. It is going to be a year in which whoever is the most liberal in his views is going to be nominated in the primaries and elected in November—whether he be republican or democrat. Make no mistake about it. It is in the air."

Most of them agreed with him, although some thought he put it a bit too strongly.

**MOBILIZING MOTOR TRUCK FLEET FOR EMERGENCY**

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 13.—A fleet of 200 trucks to transport United States mail has been lined up by Postmaster H. J. McCurry for instant call in case of an emergency should a complete railroad tieup prevent transportation of mail over transcontinental lines. Announcement of this was made yesterday by Postmaster McCurry after a survey of the field here.

**FIND FREMONT RELICS IN MONO FOREST RESERVE**

MINDEN, Nev., Aug. 13.—Relics of General Fremont's march to California in 1844 have been found by A. Ferguson, a prospector, in the Mono national forest, while mining for gold in the gravel near Fales Hot Springs, Ferguson unearthed two two-pounder cannon balls, part of the standard ammunition carried by Fremont for his howitzer.

**GRASS FIRES STILL ARE BURNING IN TEHAMA CO.**

RED BLUFF, Calif., Aug. 13.—Grass and brush fires were reported late yesterday as still doing considerable damage to property in the

northwestern part of the county. The menace is centered on the Diamond range, where the blaze started Sunday evening, and the flames meanwhile have been spreading in all directions.
