One-Stop Transcontinental Flight To Be Attempted By Texas Aviator

Lieutenant Doolittle Will Try to Cross Continent in Twenty-Three Hours

(By International News Service) JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Aug. 15.—Despite his disastrous fall recently, Lieutenant James H. Doolittle will again attempt to make a one-stop transcontinental flight from here to Rockwell field, San Diego, Calif. The exact date of his second attempt has not yet been set.

The only stop planned by Lieutenant Doolittle, who admits he will do that much, will be at his home station at Kelly field, San Antonio, Texas. When he makes his only stop his associates will give him a rousing welcome and a rousing send-off when he resumes his flight, after replenishing the tanks of his machine with gasoline.

In preparation for his second attempted transcontinental flight, Lieutenant Doolittle is having a special De Havilland plane constructed. The gas tank of his airplane will have a 275-gallon capacity, while the oil tank will be designed to carry 24 gallons.

Lieutenant Doolittle hopes to make the flight in 23 1/2 hours of actual flying time.

A native of California, Lieutenant Doolittle has been in the aviation service since war was declared



against Germany. He did not serve overseas, however.

W. C. T. U. Column

Letters from leading American women protesting violently against any change in the Volstead act, continue to pour into the office of the Union Signal, the official publication of the National Women's Christian Temperance Union.

Frances E. Burns, great commander of the Ladies of the Maccabees, writes:

"For thirty years I have been working with a group of 60,000 women, and have seen the difficulties many women had to meet in connection with the drink problem. Everywhere women are expressing to me the gratifying change which has resulted since the Eighteenth amendment, stating that for the first time in many years the wages of the head of the family are used for the benefit of the home and family instead of being spent in a saloon. Repeatedly women say to me, 'My husband is a different man since we have prohibition.' Since my experience has not been local, but has covered the entire United States I have come to know that the greatest possible benefit has resulted from the national prohibitory law."

Effects of Prohibition on the Lumber Industry

Caroline R. Swope, Thorp, Wash., writes:

"I do not think it is possible for one unfamiliar with conditions under license to realize what a saloonless America, made so by the adoption of the Eighteenth amendment, means to the lumber industry, employers and employees. In the last few weeks I have asked both of them this question: 'What are the effects of prohibition?' This reply came from a lumber dealer and factory man of 30 years' experience:

"Our men come to their work more regularly, have become better educated, are more faithful and reliable, and every man is back at his job after payday. SOBER. Money that formerly went to the saloon is now used for the home and to buy family comforts. Fathers now realize they are fathers and spend their spare time with their children. My men nearly all have cars and enjoy life. Yes, business is decidedly better than before we had prohibition."

"Others assert that women and children are better fed and clothed, families own their own homes, and the workmen have farms. Men are healthier and more regular at their work, wives and families are looked after better, and life in general is much more tolerable for the men in the logging and lumber business than in the old days. I believe our men, as well as we, appreciate the improved conditions."

HECKER BROUGHT BACK FROM SALEM PENDING APPEAL

SALEM, Or., Aug. 18.—Russell Hecker, 23, convicted of the murder of Frank Bowker, Portland musician, April 17, has been transferred from the state penitentiary here to Clackamas county, pending appeal to the supreme court. Hecker, who was sentenced to hang September 22, was granted a stay of execution when his case was appealed to the higher court.

Due to the condition of the Clackamas county jail at Oregon City, he will be confined in the Multnomah county jail at Portland.

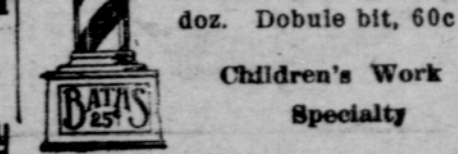
