RURAL WOMEN RAISING HIGH-BRED CHICKENS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Farm women enrolled in agricultural extension poultry clubs last year raised 2,088,127 standard bred chickens, according to the department of agriculture.

They received for chickens and poultry products sold \$1,617,047.83, in addition to the supply produced for home use.

NOW IS THE TIME FOR CODLIN MOTH SPRAY

The second brood of codlin moth is now just about at the peak of the brood. Lots of eggs are being laid every day, and a great deal of infection may be expected from now until the fruit is harvested. All fruit that is not to be picked until the very near future should be covered thoroughly.

For this application it is well to use a spreader, at the rate of one pound to the 200 gallon tank. In districts where codlin moth are exceptionally bad, use six pounds of dry arsenate of lead to the 200 gallon tank.
