All coming social or organization meetings of societies where no money contribution is solicited, initiation charged, or collection taken IS NEWS.

CIRCUIT COURT JUDGESHIP

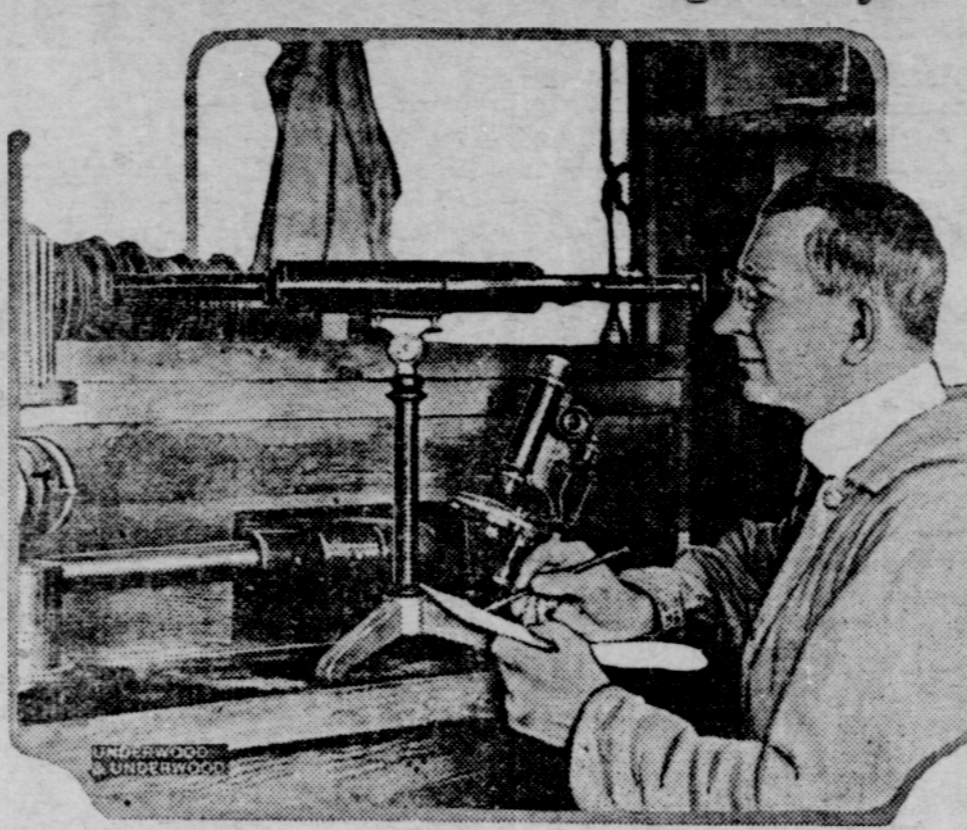

 In Jackson county there is an example of the bitterness that results when a religious debate is made the overshadowing issue in an election. Former Senator Thomas, with a most excellent record in the legislature, was overwhelmingly nominated in the republican primaries, for circuit judge. Very bitter feeling was aroused in the recent recall election out there, and some of his critics are publicly demanding that Senator Thomas declare his position with reference to the Ku Klux Klan.

Suppose Senator Thomas, as a candidate for judge, should make a statement denouncing secret organizations in general and the Ku Klux Klan in particular, and suppose that he should be elected judge. Several Jackson county citizens are now under indictment for alleged connection with Klan activities. Their cases might not come to trial until the judge soon to be elected, takes his seat. It is scarcely thinkable that the fair minded people of Jackson county would want them tried by a judge who, through a public statement, had previously acknowledged that he had prejudged their cases.

SPACE BEING TAKEN FOR COMMERCIAL EXHIBITS

The Fair association is erecting a temporary building to house commercial displays at the Jackson county fair this fall, as all the space in the agricultural and horticultural building has been reserved for some time for club and community displays.

The temporary structure is to be 72 by 150 feet, and will be covered with the huge canvas purchased by the Fair association from the government. The sidewalls of the structure will be of wood, and it will have a sawdust floor, which will be sprinkled every morning, thus keeping the space clear of dust and dirt. The interior space will be so arranged that there is a 12 foot aisle through the center, with 12 booths on either side, each of which is 12 feet square. Half of the booths have already been purchased, and the others are expected to be taken within the next day or two. Each booth sells for \$25, with the privilege of putting any display that may be desired within.
