SPARKS PREDICTS BANNER PEAR CROP FOR 1922

EUGENE, Aug. 23.—I. T. Sparks of the local Southern Pacific offices, who returned today from a short stay in the Medford district, says that section is going to have a banner pear crop this season.

The field will amount to about 1259 cars. During the time when the strike was most threatening, the growers were worried for fear that they would be unable to move their produce, but the empties are available now. The pears are of good size and shape. They are moving at the rate of about 20 cars a day. The Bartlets are mostly going to the canneries of Oregon and California, and the other varieties are being shipped to the east.

HENRY FORD PROVES TOO MUCH FOR COAL BARONS

DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 23.—Owing to the shortage of coal, the Ford Motor company's Highland Park plant has been equipped with oil burners, it was announced today. The change was made without loss of time to any of the 42,000 employees.

The Ford company, it is understood, has placed orders for 12,000,000 gallons of fuel oil. Before installing oil burners, coke screenings and other fuels were tried out, but found unsatisfactory.
