### Accused of Brutal Murder of Woman For Insurance

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 25.—With the arrest of Albert J. Lowe, insurance agent, on a charge of murder, Greeley, Colo., police authorities announce they believe they have unraveled the mystery of the death at that city, ostensibly through the explosion of a gasoline stove, of Edna J. Skinner, 22-year-old school teacher of Bloomington, Ill.

A gruesome tale is unfolded. The young woman, who was a sister of Lowe's wife, was persuaded by him to buy an insurance policy from his company, naming him as the beneficiary. The policy he sold her was in reality her own death warrant, for he immediately, the authorities allege, began to plot her murder in a way that not only would enable him to collect the \$2000 death benefit, but also an added \$500 payment should the insured meet death through accident.

To accomplish this, the police allege, Lowe beat his kinswoman to death with a heavy stove weight, saturated the body in gasoline, wrecked an oil stove to simulate an explosion, and set fire to the kitchen of his home, in which the proceedings took place.
