Metalized Ribbons and Feathers Important Note in New Fall Hats



THE coming fall will give a pretty wide choice in hats for the fashionable one, ranging from the very wide picture hat to the small Persian turban.

In between, there is the pokenarrow at the back and fanning out generously at the sides and front—the tri-corne.

The large hat is usually edged with a soft fold of unwired material, about two inches in width, the rest of the brim being stiff. The crown is fitted, and the trimming, to be up to the last minute, should be of some metalized ribbon, or feather fancy.

The metal touch on any hat makes it a hat of the new order. A large hat of Lyons velvet is shown in the photo above. It has a crown covered with metalized ostrich, the ostrich cascading down the back in an effective manner. It is the newest sort of hat, and was therefore chosen to be worn by Leatrice Joy, Paramount player, in "Manslaughter." Cecil B. DeMille's latest photo drama. It is all in gray and she wears it with her gray velvet, chinchilla-trimmed gown.

In the sketch at the upper right, a Persian turban is shown with the latest manner of using paradise or aigrettes. The feathers are placed downward, forming a rich and soft tassel that can hardly fail to be flattering to the complexion. Sometimes they do this on both sides, but that somehow

lends a fancy dress air to the mode that is too bizarre to please the average woman. The tri-corne shapes are enchanting. Pardon the adjective, but it's really appropriate here, for these new tri-corne are replicas of the old Venetian things worn centuries ago; and somehow, modern as they are, they have an old-time look about them that is fascinating. They have falls of lace gathered around the headsize (when they are designed for evening wear), but in the daytime they are seen with no other trimming but a small cockade slapped up against the side of the crown. LOCAL MAN PURCHASES IMPROVED PAINT MACHINE

F. B. Sankey has purchased a new Decora air brush paint machine, which he received Friday of last week. This is the first machine of its kind ever used in this city, and is certainly an improvement over putting paint on with a brush. The paint is put in a container, which is connected with a motor and fan, which forces the paint through the spray brush. In this manner, one

man can paint about as fast as six men with brushes. Paint, kalsomine, shingle stain, or any kind of interior or exterior finishing may be done equally well, according to Mr. Sankey. Neither is the machine restricted to this line alone, for it can be used to paint automobiles fully as well as it does other work.

The new machine is electrically operated, but can be driven by a one and a half horse power gasoline engine when used where electric power is not available.

GRANTS PASS PLANS SPECIAL "PEACH WEEK"

GRANTS PASS, Aug. 28.—"Peach Week, August 28-September 3." This was the text of a proclamation issued Saturday by Mayor C. H. Demaray, in an effort to secure a larger local consumption of the fruit. It is estimated that at least 2500 boxes of first grade peaches will rot on the trees this week unless some concerted action is taken to relieve the situation.
