How Was Bruin Killed? By Gun Or By Oratory

With the opening of the hunting season ten days past, stories of bold and fearless hunters and various 'bear' stories are beginning to come to light. This, the latest, is credited o the Klamath Falls Herald.

What the Herald wants to know

Did Jud Short shoot the bear or FOR prompt and careful service was it talked to death by the Rev. E. F. Daugherty?

This question was advanced by the Rev. W. S. Bobbitt, of Woodland, Calif., who returned recently T. L. POWELL-GENERAL TRANS from a hunting trip on the headwaers of Cherry creek, together with Mrs. Bobbitt, the Rev. Daugherty, of Los Angeles, and J. H. Sims, of Merrill. Short was their guide.

"Not that I wish to cast any re_ flections upon my friend's vocal powers," said Bobbitt; "rather to he contrary, in fact. And that's why wondered."

The bear, it appears, was brought o camp by Short, whose story of having clubbed it to death, aroused the suspicions of the Woodland FOR TRADE-160 acre unincum reacher-suspicions directed against his Los Angeles contemporary.

"I happened to remember," said Bobbitt, "that Daugherty, a few ninutes before had been getting the 'Ravings of John McCullough' off his chest. I examined the bear and 'ound no marks except a peculiar ondition around the ears. Examing closer, I was amazed to find both ear drums split and the brain curdled. Recalling my own feelings during Daugherty's oratorical spasm I came to the conclusion that the bear was simply talked to death. This is the first case of its kind to come to my attention during many vears in the open, and I shall communicate the results of my discovery to the Smithsonian Institution."

Rev. Bobbitt said his admiration for his hunting companion had in creased fourfold, and that on a deer hunting trip at Cleark lake, he would propose that no guns be carried in order to more thoroughly
